Grand Ovation Celebrates 10th Year in Lakewood Ranch

Ranch achieves major milestones

First came the news that Lakewood Ranch was recognized as one of the top-five, best-selling master-planned communities (MPCs) in the country; then it was announced that the 10,000th home had been sold.

Coming in at No. 4 in the RCLCO survey and No. 5 in the Burns report, two independent real estate consulting firms, Lakewood Ranch outpaced many other recognizable and well-known communities in Arizona, California, Nevada, Texas, and even Florida. Lakewood Ranch saw 775 new home sales in 2016, up from 535 in 2015 – a 45 percent increase year-over-year.

Increases in sales were largely credited to successful market segmentation—the targeting of various age, income, and household segments with appropriately priced and designed residential product types and lifestyle amenities. Lakewood Ranch moved up in the 2016 rankings, benefitting from numerous new neighborhood openings and expansion of existing neighborhoods, including adding more urban and attached products to increase their share of millennials by offering both a lifestyle and price point attractive to this generation.

Another feature of the top-selling communities is the inclusion of mixeduse districts, such as Lakewood Ranch's Main Street. Also, the availability of various healthy community features

was noted, including fitness classes, active lifestyle activities, and easily accessible parks and multiuse or dedicated paths and trails for biking, walking, running and hiking. Finally, proximity to nature was listed as a valued component.

One of the underpinnings of the Ranch's ongoing success has been

its continual reinvestment in the community, evidenced by the expansion of amenity offerings at the Lakewood Ranch Golf and Country Club. A recent multi-milliondollar project included renovations to the existing athletic center and clubhouse and construction of The Lodge, a new clubhouse at the Royal Lakes Golf Course in Country Club East.

The combination of the successes of the Ranch's commercial properties and their subsequent job creation also drove growth, said Laura Cole, vice president of LWR Communities, LLC. And the Ranch's amenities didn't hurt either. "Lakewood Ranch Main Street and other shopping areas, the Premier Sports Campus and the Sarasota Polo Club have all kept Lakewood Ranch the premier new-home destination on

Florida's West Coast,"
Cole said. "The Ranch
has become a hub for
sporting events, nonprofit functions, festivals,
concerts and shows. The
community continues to
attract more visitors;
once they're here, they
want to stay."

The continued growth was evidenced in robust January sales, which helped Lakewood Ranch reach a milestone in the community's 22-year history. Eighty-six homes were sold in the first month of 2017 – a 32%

increase over January of last year – bringing the total number of homes sold in the Ranch to 10,026, with an overall sales value of close to \$4 billion.

"We are excited to have reached this milestone on the heels of having been named the fourth best-selling, master-planned community in the country in 2016," Cole said. "The Ranch has been one of the top 10, best-selling in the country for six years in a row."

There are more than 20 builders in Lakewood Ranch with 50+ models ranging in cost from \$200,000 to more than \$1 million.

Coming online at the end of 2017 is Lakewood Ranch Waterside, the newest village at the Ranch, located in Sarasota County. LWR Waterside will feature single-family homes, townhomes and apartments—all nestled among seven lakes, with walkability to the new village center, Waterside Place.

Car Meet dampened, but still lots of fun!

The winds blew a bit and the temperature was a little on the cool side, but those fans who came got so see some great older cars.

The occasion was the annual Antique Automobile Club of America Devereaux-Kaiser Car Meet, held for the last several years in Lakewood Ranch. Now, being from Detroit, and having family who worked for the "big three" automakers, cars are in my blood. So what does a guy who has the "car gene" do when there's a car show in town? He goes to the show!

As I mentioned earlier, the weather this year was not the most cooperative type for a car show, but I did get to see a really fine 1959 Cadillac – the one with the biggest fins and

bullet tail lights. It had a light blue paint job, was long and low, and those fins just created a "presence" rarely equaled by Cadillac in the years since 1959. This car epitomized the mid-century automobile advertising chant of "longer, lower, wider," arguably better than any other car of the period. And, while we're on the subject of Cadillacs, while the flyer advertising the car show had a photo of a

red '55 Cadillac on it, the '55 Caddy convertible at the show was a creamy white, albeit with a red-trimmed interior.

If you were a Packard fan, there were several vintage Packards there to drool over, including 1922, 1933, and 1937 models.

They were all in great condition, and I couldn't decide which was my favorite: was it the '33 or the '37? I'd guess the '37 - it had a massive straight-

eight engine and a cool art-deco-style hood ornament.

One of the great things about vintage car shows is the opportunity to see some fairly rare examples of automotive design, as well as cars built by manufacturers long out of business. One such example was a '67 Acadian - the Canadian version of the Chevy II. This car had a hood emblem featuring a large "A," along with three

red maple leaves. Then there was a 1951 Kaiser, here again a pretty rare vehicle, since not that many were built. One very interesting feature of many of the 1950's vintage cars at the show – they actually had back seats that could accommodate people larger than a five-year old. The Kaiser, for example, while certainly not the largest car of the

period, featured a back seat with lots of legroom, and that could easily seat three adults in comfort. The Studebaker name was represented by two of the best sporty designs of the mid-century era – a Studebaker Hawk, and an Avanti.

Perhaps the rarest midcentury vehicle at the show wasn't a car – it was a '64 Chevrolet Corvair Rampside truck, one of only a few hundred built that year. At the time, General Motors was attempting to create new uses for its rear-engine technology. They came up with compact cars, vans, and trucks, and the Rampside featured a bed that had a wide ramp on one side – a ramp that could be lowered to make it easy to move goods into the bed of the truck.

Since a car show would hardly be a car show without showing off a bit of

customization, fans could drool over a mid '60s Buick Riviera, which had been treated to a new custom paint job, along with a redone interior and a nicely upholstered trunk. There was also a sunset red '58 Chevy Impala coupe, loaded up with extra chrome accessories, and a "continental tire kit." And, while most of the cars at the show were American originals, the Brits were represented by a very nice Austin-Healy 3000, a Triumph TR6, and a massive ultra-luxo Rolls Royce, which made a singular impression on me as it rolled past ... silently.



COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM

(CERT): It CAN happen here! There has been a sense of complacency over the years about hurricane threats here in Manatee County, but 2016 was a warning. After 3,966 days without a direct hurricane hit (not since 2005), Hurricane Hermine made landfall in September. She brought serious flooding to many areas of the county, and one death. The water supplies in Sarasota and Clearwater were compromised by flood waters and a boil water notice was made. Then in October, Hurricane Matthew, a Category 2 storm, resulted in five deaths in Florida and 191,000 homes were without power. And Matthew was not a direct hit. Manatee County is still recovering from these two storms.

With tropical storms and hurricanes come tornadoes, and last year was no exception. There were two tornado deaths in January just north of Lakewood Ranch. Another tornado struck in Sarasota County causing significant damage to homes: 17,000 homes were without power, two condo complexes were damaged, and two residents were injured when the second floor of their home collapsed from the force of the tornado. In January of this year, 20 died across the southeast from

tornadoes. Hurricane season runs from June 1 through Nov. 30. Please educate yourself about severe weather threats, and have a plan. Information is available on the CERT web site, www.lwrcert.org. In the event of a major storm or other disaster, volunteers on your neighborhood CERT teams will be here to help.





"THAI" something different! Thai Spice & Sushi

Tucked away in San Marco Plaza, off Nature's Way between Lakewood Ranch Boulevard and the bustle of the Market Street shopping area, Thai Spice and Sushi is in a quiet place, but don't let the slightly out-of-the-way factor or the relative smaller stature of the San Marco Plaza deter you from experiencing a new taste.

Thai food has a reputation for being spicy – note the name of the restaurant! However, you can be assured that not ALL of their food offerings will ignite your inner self.

In order to prevent unsuspecting customers from experiencing the fullblown blast-furnace spiciness of certain dishes, the friendly folks at Thai Spice and Sushi have enhanced their menu with a "spice chart" that allows the new-to-Thai diner the opportunity to determine the relative heat of certain dishes. One pepper - not too spicy; two peppers spicier; three peppers - not for the timid.

Since my friends (and fellow diners) and I are not a particular fans of super-hot fare, we chose dishes which were defi-

nitely not accompanied by multiple pepper icons.

I began with an order of spring rolls - someone who had been there prior to my visit had highly recommended the spring rolls to me - and a bowl of wonton soup. The spring rolls were tasty, especially when combined with the appropriate sauce, which was sweet and slightly spicy, but not overpowering. The wonton soup was somewhat different than similar soups I've experienced in local Chinese eateries. The wonton pieces were noticeably thinner - almost gossamer thin, compared with the heavier sort I've had in other restaurants. The soup was garnished with very thin slices of vegetables; quite light and satisfving.

My dinner choice was based on the fact that I really like duck, and very few restaurants offer duck. When I get the chance to order duck, I usually go for it. The duck was prepared with a red pineapple sauce, and was very tasty. The portion was sufficient that I decided to take some home rather than stuff myself right there! After the spring rolls and the soup, I just didn't have all that much room left to allow me to finish it all in one sitting.

One of our friends chose a "traditional" Thai dish of Massaman – chicken thighs and wings cooked with peanuts, potatoes, and onions. Her verdict was that she enjoyed her meal.

Another one of our friends chose to experience the coconut shrimp. The shrimp were large, succulent, and heavily encrusted with shredded coconut, accompanied by rice. She was delighted by the fact that the shrimp were large and meaty, but felt that there was perhaps a bit "too much" coconut on the shrimp.

To test their theory I partook of several pieces, and found that I really liked the way it was cooked; but then I have an affinity for both shrimp and coconut, so perhaps I'm a little biased.

In any case, the portions were quite good, and no one going to Thai Spice and Sushi should worry about not getting enough to eat.

We all decided that we were too full to partake in the dessert-coconut cake. Perhaps next time. And, maybe next time I'll try some sushi.

As to the ambience of the restaurant, the folks at Thai Spice and Sushi have tried to give their place a quiet, elegant feel. If I have a criticism of the experience, I'd have to point out that, given that the location is not overly spacious, the tables are of a size that makes for comfort for two, but feels a little cramped for four people. Our waiter seemed challenged at times in finding space on our table for all the dishes that may have been needed at one time or another.

Altogether, dining at Thai Spice and Sushi was a good experience. The food was good, and the portions not skimpy.

Price-wise, I'd have to place this restaurant's prices in the "mid-range," relatively. The prices are somewhat higher than in many of the "chain" casual dining establishments in our area, but definitely not in the stratospheric high-end category. Thai Spice and Sushi – try it, you may find that you'll like it.


At a ribbon cutting last month, Foundation Executive Director Val Vance



"We're also excited to


build a world-class shopper community, where we can offer fun and flexible jobs for our shoppers, who ultimately deliver this amazing service to the community."

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LWR Main Street events give big boost to charities

Main Street at Lakewood Ranch helped more than 60 area non-profits raise more than \$800,000 in 2016. The events ranged from car shows to parades, and from bike races to the monthly "Music on Main" concert series.

Main Street has been the hub of community activity since it opened in 2005, and its reach has grown exponentially, drawing people from around the state to its numerous shows and festivals. Annual favorites now include the Memorial Day Parade, the Jingle 5K for the Arthritis Foundation, BooFest, and Holidays Around the Ranch.

Monthly, thousands come to enjoy Music on Main, which started in 2006 and became a fixture quickly with its free entertainment, family activities, and chosen charities pouring beers to earn money for their organizations.

Records have only been kept since 2012, according to Main Street Manager Amanda Zipperer, but she estimates the total earned is well over \$5 million, as

over the past five years alone they helped charities raise \$3,530,726:

"We are the heart of Lakewood Ranch," Zipperer said. "We host events to bring visibility not only to the street and merchants but to the entire Lakewood Ranch community. Our events have a social and economic impact - not only do we

major events have been on the street since our inception, but we have also added some new ones along the way as well so it doesn't get stagnant. People know that we always have something going on."


