Lakewood Ranch **Waterside** underway!

Work has begun on the first neighborhoods in Lakewood Ranch Waterside, Lakewood Ranch's newest village. Located east of I-75 and south of University Parkway, this is the Ranch's first residential foray into Sarasota County.

Pulte Homes broke ground in April of this year on two models in Shoreview, which will consist of 246 single-family detached homes on 66- and 72-foot lots. The models are estimated to be complete by July 1, 2017. Presales and site tours will begin June 1, with contracts accepted beginning July 1.

"The excitement and anticipation we are receiving for Shoreview at Lakewood Ranch Waterside has been tremendous," said Josh Graeve, vice president of sales for Pulte's Southwest Florida division. "Shoreview will offer premier estate homes on the most spectacular long lake views. Our nine floor plans are designed for how you live. The innovative designs feature open gathering areas, flexible living spaces, and personalized design options that give you the ability to give it your own special touch."

Homes by Towne plans to break ground on Lakehouse Cove by June, with model completion between December of 2017 and January of 2018. Presales will begin in

August and September for their 391 homes on 52- and 65-foot lots.

"Lakehouse Cove at Waterside is surrounded by striking natural scenery and offers a compelling combination of location, energyefficient homes, floor plans, homesite locations and design features," said Kitt Kearney, vice president of sales and marketing. "The interest in our new lakefront community has been overwhelming and we are excited to unveil our newest floor plans and Lake-House Lodge amenity center soon.'

Builders Arthur Rutenberg Homes and Lee Wetherington Homes will build within Lakehouse Cove on 76-foot lots, with two models each. "Lakehouse Cove and its amenity features will be sure to have something for everyone," said Derek Nelson, president of Arthur Rutenberg/Nelson Homes, Inc.

The community will feature 12 walkable neighborhoods interconnected with distinctive retail offerings. Waterside, when complete, will consist of 5,144 homes including apartments, condos, townhomes and single family homes, with a wide variety of price points. Waterside will be built around seven lakes, with more than 20 miles of shoreline, acres of nature preserves, an 8-acre waterfront park, and an interconnected trail system.

Waterside Place, the village center, is scheduled to begin construction in 2018, and will include apartments, restaurants, retail shops, professional offices and the Players

Centre for Performing Arts, all within walking distance of every residence.

"Kingfisher Lake is spectacular," said Gregg Carlson, CEO of Lee Wetherington Homes, "and the new Waterside Place, parks and interconnectivity will create a unique community."

The project includes much-needed infrastructure, including the extension of Lorraine Road as a four-lane thoroughfare to Fruitville Road, updates to Deer Drive, and the eventual extension of Lakewood Ranch Boulevard to Fruitville Road.

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
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

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No solutions for cell service in LWR -- yet

For years now, some Lakewood Ranch residents have had to contend with poor cell phone reception, and the problem does not lie with only one carrier, but a number of them. Several years ago, an attempt was made to install a new cell tower in District 1 (Summerfield/ Riverwalk), but this move was thwarted by a small group of residents who contended that such a tower might prove to be a health risk factor.

More recently, some Lakewood Ranch Community Development District supervisors have discussed the possibility of installing smaller towers, which would be less obtrusive, in order to improve service.

In discussions during the April Community **Development District** board meetings, supervisors noted their willingness to try to make their way out of the proverbial paper bag on the issue. They were cautioned by their attorneys - primarily Andrew Cohen - who

noted that there are currently two different proposed bills making their way through the Florida state legislature; a House bill and a Senate bill, with both getting considerable attention from lobbvists for both local governments and industry.

Cohen commented that there was a good chance that one of these bills, possibly after a number of revisions and additions, would become law before the end of the legislative session. Since the wording of the law may impact the ability of local governmental units to regulate cell facilities in their areas, Cohen recommended that the CDD boards take no action to contract for any equipment until after the new law goes into effect.

At that point, armed with knowledge as to the wording of the law, the boards might choose to act on possible alternatives. Cohen noted that he felt that hiring a cell service consultant, with a view toward getting recommendations as to what might be a good "fit" equipment-wise for Lakewood Ranch districts, would not

be a bad idea. Executive Director Anne Ross promised to take care of vetting and hiring a consultant to do a short review of the best possibilities. With the recommendations of the consultant in hand and knowing, after its passage, what the new law would do or not do, the boards could then make educated decisions as to contracting for service enhancements.

All of the Lakewood Ranch CDD Boards approved new "audit engagement" letters with the accounting form of Purvis, Gray & Company, LLP, to allow for the accounting firm to audit district finances in the coming year.

STREET LIGHTS

The new LED street lights are being installed. Several supervisors commented about the improvement in the lighting of the right-of-way. Along with those comments, Supervisor Bob Swiatek of District 1 noted that he had observed that in some cases, tree limbs were blocking the illumination from reaching intended areas. Tom Merrill, assistant director of operations for Lakewood Ranch, promised to have his guys look into this and trim trees where needed.

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Eggs, donuts, ponies, prizes – The Eggstravaganza At LWR!

Hundreds of kids, not to mention their parents and grandparents, came out to Greenbrook's Adventure Park tor a rollicking good time ... Lakewood Ranch's annual Eggstravaganza.

SERVICE

"VILLAGE IDIOTS"

Community Associations Director Gary Glass reported that he has had conversations with the president of the "Village Idiots" bicycle club regarding citizen complaints relating to: blocking traffic on Hidden River Parkway, harassing people who were parking their cars in the Main Street parking lot adjacent to the Town Hall, and some unacceptable personal behavior on the part of at least one cyclist.

Glass indicated that he feels that the club president will work to prevent repeated incidents of this sort in the future, and that there seems to be an improved level of communication between Town Hall and the club.

AIRBNB

HOA president Steve Pearce commented during the District 2 CDD board meeting that some residents have been using their homes as short-term, one-week to one-month "Airbnb" locations, in violation of the regulation requiring a minimum six-month lease for rentals in the community.

SUMMERFIELD PARK INLET REPAIR

There appears to be a small problem with drainage in an area of Summerfield Park in District 1. Apparently the inlet opening lies below the level of the ground around it. Leaves, mulch, and other debris can accumulate around the drain, causing puddling of water around the area. Most likely the inlet opening will have to be raised slightly to prevent this condition.

BELMONT PAVING ISSUE

Two bids have been received from contractors for the pavement repair

along Belmont. Once reviewed by the engineer, a contract will be extended to the winning bidder, and work will begin. District 5 Supervisor Glenda Robertson asked if there would be a performance bond requirement, and was informed that this would be part of the contract for the work.

HABITUAL SPEEDERS IN DISTRICT 6

A discussion took place during the District 6 Board meeting regarding speeders. Supervisor Henry Hofeler asked if the District could levy an additional fine above and beyond the county/state fine for speeding, as a means to deter speeders. Attorney Cohen noted that any additional fines would have to go through Manatee County, and could not just be tacked on by the District.

Another issue cropped up during the same discussion – that of long, heavy trucks coming in and out of the District, potentially causing accidents and damaging the District's roads with their weight.

Engineer Richard Ellis commented that it might be a good idea for the district to consider "beefing up" the pavement in the area of the Balmoral Gate, since this area would bear the brunt of heavy trucks moving in and out of the District. He noted that once inside the District, the roads taken by these trucks would vary, thus limiting the impact of the truck weights on District pavement in areas away from the gate.

DROUGHT CONDITIONS

District 6 Board Chairman Jim Rogoze commented that residents should be aware of the watering restrictions in place in the area, and that over-watering could bring a \$100 fine for offenders.

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
