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


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Florida Cancer Specialists **Breaks Ground** In Lakewood Ranch

The area of Lakewood Ranch north of State Road 70 and east of Lakewood Ranch Boulevard has been experiencing a building boom lately. A new shopping center has risen on that corner, featuring Earth Fare, a unique barber shop, and numerous other businesses.

But one of the more remarkable features of the area is the development located along Rangeland Parkway east of Lakewood Ranch Boulevard, directly behind and east of the shopping



First came the new Intercoastal Medical building on the northeast corner of Rangeland Parkway and Lakewood Ranch Boulevard, followed by a second Intercoastal building on Rangeland Parkway, The Sheridan Senior Living residence, a new medical supply warehouse and office space for Mercedes Medical, and at the end of July, ground was broken for a new location for the Lakewood Ranch offices and patient care facility of Florida Cancer Specialists.

Currently, Florida Cancer Specialists and Research Institute occupies office space on Health Park Way in the Ranch, but its new building being constructed on Rangeland Parkway will provide not only for lots more room for doctors' offices and patient treatment areas, but will enable their patients to access Florida Cancer Specialists' facility without having to go through another larger space, as they will occupy their own building, making for a more patient-friendly experience.

Chief Marketing and Sales Officer Shelly Glenn opened the groundbreaking ceremony by introducing a number of community leaders who were present for the ceremony, representing the Manatee Chamber of Commerce, the American Cancer Society, Team Tony, Tidewell Hospice, and the Suncoast Blood Bank, to name a few.

Brad Prechtl, CEO of Florida Cancer Specialists, and a 30-year veteran in the health care administration business, then took the opportunity to give the invited guests and staff members a rundown on some of the accomplishments of Florida Cancer Specialists. Prechtl has a background in business administration and accounting, has volunteered with the Big Brothers/Big Sisters organization, and, in 2016-'17 was the chairman of the American Cancer Society's "CEOs Against Cancer" initiative.

Florida Cancer Specialists was founded in 1984 to provide oncology and hematology services to the patients served by their local offices and clinics.

In 2009, when Brad Prechtl took over as the head of the organization, Florida Cancer Specialists had 17 locations and 45 doctors practicing in those locations.

Now, there are more than 220 doctors practicing in almost 100 locations, 155 of whom are partners in the business. In addition to doctors, Florida Cancer Specialists employs more than 180 nurse ractitioners and physicians' assistants.

On the west coast of the state, Florida Cancer Specialists offices are located from Naples in the south, to Tallahassee in the north, and around the Orlando area. On the east coast, offices can be

found from Jacksonville in the north, to Palm Beach County in the south. Florida Cancer Specialists has become the largest independent medical oncology/hematology

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CDD Boards Approve Fiscal 2019 Budgets

The various Lakewood Ranch Community ■ Development District (CDD) boards of supervisors approved their respective district budgets, as well as the assessment rolls for each district, at their August meeting.

As usual, most of the district budgets reflected a small increase in assessments, although the District 6 fiscal 2019 budget will bring a welcome decrease in assessments of approximately \$441 per residence in that district. As Jim Rogoze, chairman of the District 6 board of supervisors has noted, the District took the step of increasing its budget (and assessments) for the previous fiscal year in order to pay for items the costs of which would have come due in future years anyway, thus paving the way for the decrease in this next fiscal year's budget.

The fiscal 2019 budget for District 2 drew a certain amount of criticism from a larger than normal group of residents - primarily condo residents - from that District who attended the budget approval session on Aug. 16. The CDD assessments for District 2 residents will go up between \$112 and \$397. Some of the main reasons for the larger increases for District 2 were listed by finance director Steve Zielinski as including a lack of sufficient reserve dollars (this item was increased by 5.82%), increases in shared expenses, larger amounts being budgeted for irrigation water usage, gatehouse expense increases, and ongoing storm drain inlet repairs (this item increased by 7.08%).

There is also an item of \$50,000 in the District 2, 2019 budget to pay for efforts to combat midge flies. It was noted during the discussion that although the bottom of Lake Uihlein is owned by District 2, the water itself is owned by SMR and Braden River Utilities, and currently SMR is not involved in any efforts to control the midge flies.

A discussion took place during the District 2 meeting regarding the methodology used to determine assessments.

In April of 2018, the District hired the consulting firm Rizzetta and Company (which has consulted with 120 community development districts across Florida) to review the assessment methodology. The methodology was established after a study by Severn Trent in 1995, in order to prepare for the repayment of infrastructure bonds, as well as capital improvements and normal maintenance of facilities over time.

The District came under control of the resi-

Their report, completed in June of this year, and discussed by Scott Brizendine of Rizzetta at the August board meeting, concluded that there was no need to make changes in the assessment methodology, and that the methodology was consistent with Florida law.

The methodology includes several factors, including EDUs (equivalent dwelling units) According to Zielinski, EDUs are factored into the assessments on an equal basis, whether large or small, and EDUs are used only to determin assessments for common expenses, such as administrative salaries. With regard to commer cial properties, Zielinski noted that 2,250 square feet of commercial space is considered as one EDU, and over 10,000 square feet would be con sidered as 4-5 EDUs.

Zielinski noted that there are other factors, in cluding square footage of structures, and "trips" (an exercise in quantifying the approximat number of times that condo residents, for exam ple, use common district roads to get from their neighborhoods to other areas of the district).

Resident William Latham of Miramar noted that his condo area has its own roads, and that residents of the rest of District 2 use those road as "cut-throughs."

A number of concerned residents, primari ly from the condominium communities in the District, apparently were of the opinion that their communities were being assessed at a rate they felt resulted in the condo owners subsidiz ing the owners of single-family homes in the

Current District 2 supervisor Jerry Twiggs was the dissenting vote cast as part of the budge approval process, stating that he had no knowledge of the 1995 methodology report.

The assessment methodology process will be revisited in meetings starting in October.

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

onsider that many people moving to a Unew residence in Lakewood Ranch might be from somewhere other than Florida, meaning that there are certain things new residents need to be aware of, like just what constitutes a Community Development District, or CDD, for example.

In order to provide a learning experience for new residents, the friendly folks at the Lakewood Ranch Town Hall periodically schedule new resident orientations. These sessions are timed to happen about every two-to-three months, in order to educate new residents on many of the new things and experiences that they may encounter as residents of Lakewood Ranch, as well as to clear up any misconceptions which they might have.

The latest orientation took place in July at

Each new resident was given a bag containing a folder with a whole stack of informational pamphlets, with topics ranging from how to deal with the presence of alligators as part of the



"normal" everyday landscape in Florida, to discussions on irrigation, government functions, Community Activities, Community Emergency Response Teams, and so on. Manatee County's Disaster Planning Guide was also included. There was also a small stack of goodies included in the bag, such as writing pads and "chip clips." The packets also included a loose-leaf pock-

et sheet containing the business cards of many of Lakewood Ranch's officials, from Executive Director Anne Ross, to Chief Financial Officer Steve Zielinski, to operations officials.

After introductions by Executive Director Ross, the first speaker was Keith Pandeloglou, Community Activities director, who talked about the various opportunities for, shall we say, "fun and games" in Lakewood Ranch, noting the large number of clubs (over 50) in the community, and the various events put on by the Community Activities folks, such as the Boo Fest at Halloween, the Irish-Celtic Festival, the Eggstravaganza in the spring, and the Tribute to Heroes Parade at Memorial Day.

The Inter District Authority, or IDA, takes care of administrative functions for the CDDs, and contracts with outside providers for services.

The CDD and IDA meetings are considered government meetings under Florida law, and as such are governed by the Florida Sunshine Law, meaning that their meetings must be open to the public, and their records are public.

Operations Director Paul Chetlain outlined the responsibilities of his department for the new residents. He noted that Operations is responsible for landscaping in the common areas throughout all the CDDs, and his 20 staff members oversee items such as the 315 storm water retention ponds in the community and maintain the guardhouses and gates for those neighborhoods which have restricted

Operations is also responsible for operation and maintenance of the controllers, valves and heads of the irrigation

Community Associations Director Gary Glass discussed the functions of the community's HOAs (homeowner asso ciations), noting that their operations are governed by Florida Statute #720. In closing, Glass asked the new residents to call the Town Hall and check if they had questions!

IRRIGATION WATER SYSTEM SHUTOFF DISCUSSION

There had been some talk among supervisors and administrators relative to the possibility of shutting off the irrigation water system totally during periods of high rainfall, thus saving the residents the money that would be spent paying for water that was not needed for irrigation.



What's in a name?
The name of The name of a restaurant can conjure up a whole host of impressions ... usually food-related ... but first, a small his-

In the case of the Zenobia Mediterranean and Kebab Grill, the name harkens back almost 2,000 years, to the days of the Roman Empire and its "client states," one of which became the Palmyrene Empire.

The Palmyrene Empire, at the height of its power, stretched from modern-day Turkey in the north, to the border of the Persian Empire in the east, and Egypt to the west, and included all or part of the present-day countries of Turkey, Syria, Jordan, Lebanon, Israel, Egypt and Saudi Arabia.

The Palmyrene Empire was nominally subject to the control of Rome, but in the Third century A.D., the Roman Empire had its hands full attempting to exert its control over vast territories, fighting invaders and rebels on almost all sides.

the Palmyrene king, and, after his death, became regent for her son. She decided that with the conflicts plaguing Rome, the time was right for a little more independence. Queen Zenobia went about conquering Egypt, and extended Palmyra's borders only to find herself at odds with a reenergized Roman empire and its emperor, Aurelian, who defeated Zenobia and ended her bid to establish a permanent, autonomous Palmyrene state.



the name Zenobia have to do with the restaurant?

So, what can I say about the Zenobia restaurant? Well, for starters, as you walk into Zenobia, you will find a small table right out front. The table is covered with the implements of Middle Eastern hospitality: a coffee pot and small cups; an emphasis on making the guest feel welcome.

Near the kitchen area there is a camel saddle, and written on a plague near the door are the words Bismallah/Mashallah, which loosely translates to: "In the Name of God/As God Wills."

Now, as to the food, which is the "main event" at Zenobia. actually ate there on two separate occasions, the better to taste different dishes.

The first time I went, I joined a friend for lunch, and ordered the beef shawarma, with lentil soup, and a side order of cucumbers shredded and mixed into yogurt.

The lentil soup was very tasty, with a little bit of spice, but not too much. (Those with a hankering for additional spice might want to ask for more, but I thought it very good.)

with greens, with just the right amount of spices, and was very well-balanced by the cucumbers in yogurt, which provided a cooling counterpoint to the warm spiced meat flavor of the shawarma. I ordered the beef kafta kabob, which featured two large skewers of beef, well-seasoned and served with pita bread, sauce and rice. My friend ordered the chicken shawarma only with rice instead of bread, and ordered the cucumbers in yogurt as her side item. We ate our fill of the main dishes as well as the hum mus, and she elected to take the rest of the pita bread and hummus home with her.

We split an order of baklava – a must if you go to Zenobia(!), and order Turkish coffee, which came in small cups, quite strong and very good.

As for the quality of the food at Zenobia, really like this place, and all of us liked the food.

The people who wait on you are family mem bers, the food is very tasty, and a great variation from a diet of sandwiches, pizza, tossed salad and burgers at chain restaurants.

So go there, eat, and tell your friends about this place.

You'll be glad you did. I plan on going back so should you!
