#### The Story and Purpose of "Forward Manatee"

The next few paragraphs will tell the story of the "Forward Manatee" Political Action Committee (PAC) to support two referenda on the Nov. 8 ballot. That ballot language is available at the Manatee County Supervisor of Election's website and addresses the following two initiatives:

• For Manatee County – A new  $\frac{1}{2}$  cent sales tax for existing infrastructure, focusing on transportation (71%), public safety and law enforcement (15%), and parks and green spaces (14%).

• For the Manatee County School Board - A continuation of a ½ cent sales tax for school construction and renovation, school security, technology and safety.

These measures are really about the kind of future we want for Manatee County. Do we want better roads? Do we want better schools? Do we want safer communities?

The beauty of these two initiatives is that not only will every dollar raised stay right here in Manatee County, every dollar spent will be overseen by independent citizen-run oversight commit-

tees. And, it is worth noting, tourists and visitors to our community will help pay for needed infrastructure, and the costs for better roads, schools and safer neighborhoods will not be borne just by property owners.

If both pass, the sales tax rate in Manatee County will be 7%, exactly the same as in Sarasota, Pinellas, Charlotte, Pasco and Hillsborough counties. Clearly, Manatee County is the loner in the region without these resources.

As for a little history on the County's piece, in 2015, the Manatee County Board of County Commissioners formed a diverse citizens' committee (the Committee) which was comprised of appointees by each commissioner (seven total) plus an appointee from each of six key County business

organizations (including the Lakewood Ranch Business Alliance), for a total roster of 13.

Most of us on the Committee entered that fourplus month investigative and learning process with a healthy level of skepticism about the County's need for additional revenue. As the chair of that group, I worried about what form our final deliberations might take. Sparing you the lengthy details, the Committee voted unanimously in support of a new ½ cent infrastructure sales tax for the County. The

• The budget process itself is rigorous and almost continuous, calling on each line item to earn its way into the final budget.

• Property tax rates in Manatee County are the lowest on the Gulf Coast, and the Committee felt that should not be jeopardized, nor should property owners be called on to shoulder an inordinate share of the cost of County government.

• The infrastructure sales tax would cost the typical Manatee County family about \$5 a month, and lends itself to being paid 1/3 by visitors and non-residents who provide wear and tear on the County's infrastructure but pay nothing for its upkeep (Note: the "tourist bed tax" by statute is not available for infrastructure purposes).

• Finally, this approach would result in almost immediate action on

long-overdue projects on the County's list. Taken together with the historically low interest rate environment in the government bond market (particularly for a highlyrated local government like Manatee County), this is an incredibly fortunate convergence of opportunity for the citizens of Manatee County that would be regrettable to miss out on.

Having spent a fair amount of my career working in the eastern portion of Manatee County and Lakewood Ranch, and while it is "newer" in a sense, it shares in these needs and would certainly participate in the many benefits. The County's project list, faithful to the recommendations of the Committee, includes a fair distribution of project benefits throughout the County, which will be protected by the alreadyestablished citizen's oversight committee.

As to the school element, it is important to remember it is a continuation of the existing ½ cent sales tax for schools. The fine new, newer and renovated schools in Manatee County are the direct result of the original passage of this measure. Now is not the time to deprive the Manatee **County School District** and its students of these critical funds. The needs are obvious:

- Repair, renovate and maintain existing schools
- Relieve overcrowding at existing schools
- Improvements in school safety
- Improvements in school technology
- New and improved student transportation / buses

These are essentials for

the competitive market our students will be in. Whether you have children in Manatee County schools or not, quality education defines the fabric of every community, and is at the core of sustained economic prosperity. Manatee County Schools' new Superintendent Dr. Dianna Greene has clearly demonstrated her leadership and that she is worthy of our trust. We need to reciprocate and get this funding done. As she so ably says, "This is the Right Path. Right Now."

Forward Manatee, while still young, has earned the support of many individuals, businesses and organizations in Manatee County, including endorsements from the Lakewood Ranch Business Alliance, the Manatee Chamber of Commerce, the Bradenton Area Economic Development Corporation and the Realtor Association of Sarasota and Manatee.

As a fellow citizen of Manatee County, I respectfully ask you with all of my energy to invest in Manatee County and Vote Yes on 6 and 7 on Nov. 8. It is simply the right and necessary thing to do for the future of ALL of Manatee County.

## 19th Annual Thunder by the Bay Motorcycle **Festival comes to the Ranch For 2017**

Suncoast Charities for Children announced new venue locations for next vear's festival, scheduled for Jan. 5-8, 2017. Locations include Premier Sports Campus and the Ancient Oak Gun Club at Lakewood Ranch, and Gulf Gate Village in Sarasota.

Lucy Nicandri, the executive director for Suncoast Charities for Children the festival's director, said the decision to change venues was prompted in part by economics. Events like Thunder By The Bay, produced by Suncoast Charities for Children, have always been free to the public and will continue."

Area businesses leaders from Lakewood Ranch have openly welcomed the festival knowing its longstanding history, economic impact it brings to the area, and revenues raised for Suncoast Charities for Children. Net proceeds from this annual event allows Suncoast Charities for Children to provide support to five local nonprofit agencies that serve more than 8,000 children, teens, and adults with special needs. "We are very excited to welcome this festival to the Lakewood Ranch com-



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## Old information center purchase a dead issue?

For several months now, an ad hoc committee that had been established to look into the possible lease or purchase of the old Lakewood Ranch Information Center building, located on Lakewood Ranch Boulevard south of State Road 70, has been meeting among themselves and with representatives of Schroeder-Manatee Ranch, the developer of Lakewood Ranch and the owner of the property. The group was studying the possibility of purchasing or leasing the building for use as a potential community center.

Apparently, along with unanswered questions relating to security and staffing, no agreement to purchase, lease, or otherwise acquire the property appeared to be in the offing. At its last meeting on Sept. 6, the committee voted to take no further action on the matter.

The District 1 Board of Supervisors (District 1 governs the area where the old information center is located), at their Sept. 15 meeting, voted to dismiss the committee with thanks for their efforts.

District 1 residents had expressed their preference that the structure be turned into a community or youth center, rather than be converted to commercial use.

#### STATE ROAD 70/GREENBROOK BOULEVARD WEST SIGNAL LIGHT

At the District 4 CDD Board meeting, Supervisor Keith Davey reported that the installation of a traffic signal at the intersection of State Road 70 and Greenbrook Boulevard West, which had originally been scheduled for completion in November of this year, would be pushed back until after the first of the new year.

Residents had been requesting a traffic signal at that intersection for some time, especially since the development of the apartment complex on the north side of State Road 70 has resulted in a large increase in the number of vehicles turning on to State Road 70 in that area.

#### **LED LIGHTING**

Bids have been received for the conversion of street lights in Lakewood Ranch to LED lighting, and a "test area" has been set up on Lakewood Ranch Boulevard to enable officials to select just which variety of LED fixtures they want to have installed. The LED lighting project is seen as a way to promote better street illumination while making for a lower energy cost to residents.

The new fixtures would be installed atop current light poles, so there will be no need to erect new poles, unless a need for new poles in a particular area is seen as warranted. The test lighting fixtures were installed in September, and a decision as to which type of fixture will be used will be made in October.

#### TREE TRIMMING/ REMOVAL

During the District 2 CDD Board meeting, the board discussed whether the district should get involved in the removal of trees or the trimming of roots on those trees that might be contributing to a safety issue.

Normally the district does not get involved in such trimming, but attorney Andrew Cohen offered his opinion that if a tree is creating a safety issue (such as root growth lifting a section of sidewalk), the district should take appropriate action to ensure public safety.

#### **FINANCIAL AUDITS**

Finance Director Steve

Zielinski reported to the district boards that the annual financial audits of district books have begun, and should be completed by year-end.

Zielinski also noted that irrigation water bills from Braden River Utilities had gone down in August, but not as much as expected, given the large amount of rainfall. One reason may be the discovery of a major leak in a main pipe along State Road 70.

The District 6 CDD Board did not meet in September due to the lack of a quorum.

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### Fruit of the vine: Taste a few at Cheers to Wine

The ancient Romans had a saying, "In Vino Veritas," which they got from the ancient Greeks (like a lot of other things, such as whole pantheon of gods).

"In Vino Veritas" translates into "In wine there is truth," which may be the reason that people are expected, after a few glasses, to be more truthful than they might be without the taking of the grape.

But whether wine succeeds in producing truth or not, there is a place right here in Lakewood Ranch that caters to the discriminating wine enthusiast, as well as to those whose past wine experience runs to the likes of the cheap, screwtop-bottle stuff they bought in college when the aim was quantity, and not necessarily quality.

Cheers To Wine, located in the San Marco Plaza, is the creation of Robin and Carmen Spagnola, whose wine loving credentials go back to their early years in Connecticut. They were formerly cochairs of the Fairfield County chapter of the American Wine Society. Carmen's experience also includes teaching both winemaking classes and wine appreciation classes, along with being an officer of the American Wine Society's national executive board. He's also a member of the Society of Wine Educators!

Robin notes that when they were checking out

communities in Florida in planning for their retirement adventures, they had seen several other areas. but she remembers that she fell in love with Lakewood Ranch. When Carmen suggested that they continue their search, she told him that she wanted a home in the Lakewood Ranch Country Club period - and that she was not at all interested in looking at any other locations! So they came to Lakewood Ranch, and later established Cheers To Wine in San Marco.

Now just what sort of wine shop is Cheers To Wine?

For starters, part of the fun of Cheers To Wine comes from the fact that a

customer can actually learn about wine, winemaking, and the various types of wine, in an atmosphere of fun. You see, Cheers To Wine has a weekly wine tasting event, held around their in-house wine bar, from 6 to 8 p.m. every Friday night. For the princely sum of five bucks, you'll be able to taste several choice wines of various types. One woman, who described herself as a regular attendee, commented that the weekly wine tastings were like a gathering of old friends very casual and convivial.

I decided to take advantage of this event one evening, and not only did I get to try out several interesting wines, I also got

to have a conversation with the distributor of the particular Italian wines being served, who told me a lot about the vinevards they came from and how some of the wine was created. For instance, I learned that one wine (I actually bought a bottle of this delightful stuff!) was created from grapes picked over a total of seven harvests, running from September to December, in order to heighten the sweetness of the product. The reason for the several harvests is that the winemaker waited until a certain number of grapes had attained their full sweetness right on the vine before harvesting them. Some grapes matured earlier, and so were picked earlier. Others were picked later. The distributor also noted that the vineyard that produced this wine was probably smaller in area than the entire "footprint" of San Marco Plaza!

Now, as to what goes with wine, Cheers To Wine carries a number of goodies to accentuate your wine enjoyment. Your Cheers To Wine staffer can guide you in choosing from a selection of meats, cheeses, and even chocolate. That's right - CHOC-OLATE! After all, chocolate is one of the major food groups, isn't it? Believe it or not, Cheers To Wine carries Brix chocolates, which are specially formulated to perfectly match up with different varieties of wine. As the saying goes ... "Try it! You'll like it!"

If you're a new customer, you might notice that at Cheers To Wine, the bottles are not displayed in groups based on the particular variety of wine. such as Cabernet, Chardonnay, etc. Instead, they are grouped by whether they are red or white wines, and whether the particular wine is, for red wines, bold, mellow or fruity, and for white wines, whether the wine is crisp, silky or rich. There are other categories for champagnes and extra sweet wines.

Cheers To Wine offers customers the opportunity to become members of their Wine Club. Wine Club membership allows the customer to purchase wine at a lower price than non-members, and the

weekly wine tastings are included as a no-charge perk.

Admittedly, there are some among us who aren't all that fond of wine. To enable these fine folks to enjoy some liquid refreshment either on their own, or while their friends are partaking of the wine tasting event, Cheers to Wine carries a good stock of craft beers, in bottles large enough to satisfy a big thirst. These beers are also categorized as to their type, be it robust, earthy, or sweet. If you want to sit down for a while and drink your beer (or wine) chilled, just say the word and Cheers To Wine will happily chill it for you in a jiffy - while you wait!

I have certain friends who are definitely confirmed wine enthusiasts. So, what to get them for a gift which won't duplicate something they might already have?

## Southeastern Guide Dogs holds graduation at LWR's Polo Grill

Is there any dog more beautiful than a golden retriever? That rich, brilliant color; that flowing, long-haired image when the golden takes off running after a Frisbee. That calm grace and unending love.

Well, perhaps there is something better, and it comes in the form of a Southeastern Guide Dogs trained dog, be it a golden retriever, Labrador retriever, or a mix of golden and Lab.

Southeastern Guide Dogs is the only certified guide dog training school in the southeastern region of the United States, and one of only around 20 nationwide.

This summer, Southeastern Guide Dogs held a graduation ceremony for the most recent teams of sight-limited students and their guide dogs at Lakewood Ranch's Polo Grill ballroom.

One of the graduates, along with his new guide dog, Kevin, was Chris McNamee, a Lakewood Ranch resident, who had been a manufacturing executive back in Wisconsin, but was forced by the effects of retinitis pigmentosa, a progressively degenerative eye disease, to retire. McNamee had been paired early on with his now-retired guide dog,

Max, who had helped him walk his daughter down the aisle at her wedding in Italy. Every one of the graduates made comments on their experiences, and McNamee noted that Southeastern Guide Dogs was "an incredible organization." McNamee is now a board member at Southeastern, and was the chairman of the recent walkathon, held in ... Lakewood Ranch, of course!

Southeastern specializes in two prime types of trained dogs: The first type are those dogs that are trained to be the sight and "leader" for an individual who is blind, or whose sight has been compromised by disease to the point that they are not able to function without assistance.

The second type are those which, through Southeastern's Paws for Patriots program, are trained to work with members of our military who have been either rendered blind by their combat experience, have severe physical limitations from those experiences, or those whose lives have been scarred by Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD).

All this training takes place at Southeastern Guide Dogs' campus located in Palmetto. There, puppies are bred, using scientific breeding methods in order to produce

the healthiest, most intelligent, trainable dogs. The puppies are given the opportunity to play with visitors to the Southeastern campus, and after "preschool and kindergarten" are then given over to "puppy raisers" - volunteers who take the puppies home and socialize them, in their own family setting, taking the puppies out into the world in order to prepare them for their training.

At 14-18 months, the dogs are returned to the Southeastern campus to undergo their "college education." At this stage, they are assessed to determine what "major" they will pursue in their careers.

A guide dog major involves six months of formal training, plus a 26-day session together with a student-handler, who will graduate with the dog as a team.

The service dog major involves a similar sixmonth period of training followed by a specialized session to enable the dog and their veteran-partner overcome the effects of PTSD.

Some dogs are selected for the facility therapy major. These dogs will be working in military medical centers to interact with both injured soldiers and their families in aiding their recovery.

Since the quality of the guide and service dogs

trained by Southeastern is of prime importance, some dogs are placed into the breeding program. Volunteers assist in this phase by taking the mother dogs into their homes.

In addition to the four major "career paths," some dogs are selected to be public service dogs, which may involve training in areas such as explosives detection and arson investigation. Other dogs can become companion dogs to children with vision problems, while still others may become "ambassador dogs," helping to educate the public about Southeastern Guide Dogs.

After their "work lives" are completed, the former guide or service dogs are retired, and some go back to their puppy raisers to live out their retirement.

The keynote speaker for the graduation ceremony at the Polo Grill was Tracev Rhodes, a former paramedic in Charlotte, N.C. Rhodes told how she was a functioning paramedic one day, driving an ambulance around Charlotte, and the next day was judged legally blind. She found herself without a career, and had originally relied on her children to help her navigate through her life. But her children got older, and developed lives of their own. Rhodes realized that she could not rely on her kids forever and, having remembered meeting puppy raisers vears before at Disnev World, finally applied to get a guide dog. Today, with her guide dog Gary, a golden retriever, Rhodes has, in her words, "gained a measure of independence she didn't know was possible." Her experience at Southeastern was so life-changing that Rhodes moved to Florida and now works at Southeastern.

Rhodes' challenge to the graduates: "Let every day be an adventure." She noted that as Southeastern grads, they are "part of the pack, and it takes a pack to create a superhero."

Southeastern Guide Dogs offers tours of their training campus, and playing with a bunch of little furry puppies as part of your tour is a treat not to be missed.


