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

The Premier Sports Campus at Lakewood Ranch, will offer free admission and plenty for guests to enjoy. An outstanding lineup of live music is on tap, with special guest Blue Oyster Cult in concert on at 4 p.m. Jan. 8. Guests can expect to sit under the "Big Top" tent and enjoy the music,

great food, and plenty of vendors. New this year is a "Taste of Thunder" area, open from 1-4 p.m. Guests can experience fine craft beer, wine, and spirits tastings of their choice for \$10. There will also be a "Light Up The Night" Bike Show on Saturday evening and an 18 Class Bike Show on

Sunday. Festival VIP tickets are available for \$100 each and may be purchased in advance through the Festival website.

Other events include a sporting clays tournament at Ancient Oak Gun Club on Jan. 5. A "Born To Be Wild" kickoff party at the Polo Grill and Bar will be held Jan. 6. This event will feature paired food and beverage tasting stations, an open bar, silent auction and live music from The Billy Rice Band. Limited tick-

ets are available for \$100 each and can be purchased through the Festival website. That same evening, The Coral House in Sarasota will host a "Welcome Thunder" fundraising event for Suncoast Charities for Children from 3 until 10 p.m.

On Jan. 7, a Finz Finds "Cruise for Cash" Charity Motorcycle Ride will begin at the office location for Suncoast Charities for Children (4630 17th St., Sarasota). Clients with special needs,

who receive services from Suncoast Charities, will greet riders as they register from 9:30 until 11:30 a.m. Z105 will also be on hand, playing classic rock favorites. Riders can register for \$20 with \$4,000 in cash prizes up for grabs.

This year's Festival is presented by Rossiter's and Manatee River Harley-Davidson, Sarasota Ford, The Premier Sports Campus at Lakewood Ranch, and Schroeder-Manatee Ranch/LWR Communities. Major cash

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District 6 not jumping on led lighting bandwagon ... yet

All the Lakewood Ranch Community Development District (CDD) boards, with the exception of District 6, have signed contracts to replace their old sodiumtype street light heads with new and much more economical LED lighting equipment.

The LED lights will cost a lot less to operate, and will provide for improved lighting, but while the other districts have already signed their contracts with the supplier, the board of supervisors of District 6 is continuing to delay action on the proposal.

This board has, in the recent past, asked for and received a lot of resident input prior to making any major decisions regarding District expenditures.

Since it is the smallest of the Lakewood Ranch Country Club districts, costs of new projects have to be spread over a smaller population of residents. What this means is that the cost of a similar project in districts 2 or 5 may have a lesser impact as far as assessments are concerned, than a project in District 6.

Rather than jump on

the LED bandwagon just yet, the District 6 board is committed to getting more resident input and studying the matter more fully before arriving at a final decision as to whether or not to put LED heads on its 30 street lights.

One resident, Dairmuid McSweeney, came to the November District 6 board meeting to offer his expertise and suggestions as to factors which the board might consider. McSweeney, a Fellow of the Illuminating Engineering Society of North America and now retired, spent his career as an illuminating engineer, and has long-term experience in both designing and producing lighting equipment.

In offering his services to the District 6 board, McSweeney noted among other things that it does little good to install better lighting if the areas to be illuminated are blocked off by tree growth. If the lighting is blocked off by tree limbs, he said, you might not see the deer – or person – in the roadway!

In District 6, many of the streetlights are close to residences, and the board is concerned that the wrong type of lighting fixtures might result in too much light being projected into residents' windows.

As for whether delaying action on this project might cost the district more due to the potential inability to become part of a larger community "buy" of equipment, District 6 chairman Jim Rogoze indicated that the board felt that this would probably not be an issue.

District 6's board also committed to a contract to install holiday decorations, and plans to purchase a lighted menorah, rather than rent one for the District's display, as the rental fee seemed rather high.

CONTRACTOR COUNTRY CLUB ACCESS

The various Country Club district boards gave their approval to a revised set of transponder fees for contractor use. The IDA will make the formal decision, but it appears that contractor transponder fees will be set at \$50 per year.

EARLY VOTING AT LAKEWOOD RANCH TOWN HALL

Executive Director Anne Ross informed the CDD board supervisors that around 16,000 people voted early at the Lakewood Ranch Town Hall prior to Nov. 8.

HOLIDAY-TIME HOME SAFETY

Outgoing District 2 supervisor and Safety Committee chairman Richard Moran noted that during the year-end holiday period, many packages are delivered to area homes, and may be left on the front porch if the resident is not at home. He suggested that residents, if they are not going to be home, ask their neighbors to pick up these packages, lest they get picked up by thieves.

DISTRICT 1

District 1's board of supervisors did not hold a formal meeting in November due to the lack of a quorum.

DISTRICT 2

A discussion was held during the District 2 board meeting regarding the removal of alligators from the community. At present, there have been 19 alligators removed from Lakewood Ranch during this year, which is close to the maximum amount of 25 authorized by the community's permit. Two large gators, which were apparently fighting with each other, were recently removed. (Note: This type of behavior becomes more prevalent during alligator mating season.)

It was noted that some residents are not happy with the removal of the gators, since, at present, the gators that are removed are killed and their hides, etc., are disposed of by the trappers. However, it would be difficult, if not also more costly, to change the procedure so as to make sure that the gators are released into a wild area rather than eliminated.

Supervisor Tom Green suggested that, as part of

Lakewood Ranch's newresident orientation program, a section should be devoted to educating northerners about Florida wildlife.

DISTRICT 4

The District board is considering whether to install additional speed bumps on the roadway leading into Adventure Park.

DISTRICT 5

Operations Director Paul Chetlain informed the District 5 board that geotechnical examination of the road and sewer problems on Legacy took place in September, and that issues have been identified, in order that work may soon commence to repair the problems.

Supervisor Alan Silverglat asked Finance Director Steve Zielinski about the ongoing cost of outside consultants who are involved in installing and implementing new software. Zielinski said that the costs are close to double the estimated amount for these fees.

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



European Showcase by Figo a huge success

Luis Figo, one of Portugal's most legendary soccer players, hosted his "European Showcase By Figo" tournament Nov. 11-13 at Premier Sports Campus (PSC) in Lakewood Ranch. More than 200 teams of boys and girls, ranging in

age from 8 to 18 years, participated for a chance to win prizes. The showcase is part of Figo's new International Visibility Program for youth soccer, and is sanctioned by Florida Youth Soccer Association with the support of the

Lakewood Ranch Chargers Soccer Club.

The purpose of the event, which is planned to be held annually, is to elevate the local youth teams with top European development programs, bringing know-how, con-











tinuous education and proven European methodologies. The program strives to generate real opportunities to compete with European teams and promote the international visibility of the local teams, local coaches and local youth players in the European market place.

"The European Showcase by Figo was another fantastic event for our Premier Sports Campus and the Lakewood Ranch community," said Antonio Saviano, director of sports for the PSC. "More than 90% of the teams traveled from out of town and some as far as Argentina. The economic benefits and the recognition for our area was huge."

The European Showcase By Figo featured Figo himself, who lead the tournament and contributed his international soccer experience, along with his technical staff with several UEFA PRO coaches.

"Having Luis Figo on site at Premier Sports Campus during the entire event added one more element to this soccer tournament," Saviano said. "It's not every day you see a soccer star such as Luis Figo on site during a major youth soccer tournament."

Figo made his name in Spain playing for powerhouse teams Real Madrid and FC Barcelona before switching to Inter Milan in 2005. He has been named European Footballer of the Year and FIFA World Player – soccer's highest individual honor. He represented Portugal in the 2002 and 2006 World Cup. Before joining Real Madrid in 2000, Figo played for FC Barcelona (1995-2000) and Sporting Lisbon (1989-95).

Also popular was the barbeque from Nancy's, a pasta dish from Salute!, a multitude of cheeses and other goodies offered by the culinary arts students at Manatee Tech, and some Key Lime pie from the Caribbean Pie Company.

You need something to wash down all that food. So, the choice came down to a decision among wine, or hard cider, or beer ... that's right, craft beer, from the likes of the new Naughty Monk Brewery - Lakewood Ranch's newest entry into fun food and drink.


If you needed to take a break from all that food and drink, there were new high-tech Porsches from Suncoast Motorsports to drool over, and let's not forget the silent auction tent,



LWR Knights participate in Veterans Day commemoration

The Knights of Columbus has a long history of identifying with America's military forces and our veterans.

Originally founded in the 1880s by parish priest Father Michael McGivney in New Haven, Conn., the Knights of Columbus began as an organization dedicated to assisting the wives and children of men no longer capable of providing for their families, often as a result of an on-thejob injury or death. In those days, there was no such thing as workman's compensation. If you got injured or killed on the job, the boss notified your family, and that was the end of it.

As the organization grew, and with the United States entry into World War I, the Knights, being patriotic Americans, established what they referred to as "huts" near the combat zones in France, providing refreshments and a place where any soldier could, for a short time, socialize and enjoy some "non government-issue" refreshments. These huts were equipped with signs stating "Everyone Welcome, Everything Free."

Today, as the world's largest Catholic men's fraternal organization, the Knights – especially Fourth Degree Knights, continue to participate in

activities directed toward promoting patriotism and working to assist our veterans.

On Nov. 11, Veterans Day, the Fourth Degree Knights of Assembly # 3192, which meets at Our Lady of the Angels Church in Lakewood Ranch, together with their Brother Knights, relatives and guests from around Southwest Florida, gathered for a special Memorial Veterans Day Mass at the Sarasota National Cemetery, presided over by Bishop Frank Dewayne of the Diocese of Venice in Florida.

This event marks the seventh year that this celebration has been held at the Sarasota National Cemetery. What began seven years ago with a few Knights and their families in a large tent set up in an unoccupied area of the cemetery has grown into a large event taking up the entirety of the structure of Patriot Plaza.

Patriot Plaza is an area created in a cooperative effort between the Patterson Foundation and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. It is the first space of its kind in any National Cemetery in the country, and features art telling the story of the lives of military families.

One panel bore the remembered comment of a child of a military family:

"My Dad was a World War II veteran, and he

taught all of us that our country's strength was in its diversity – accepting all races, creeds cultures and religions.

That made us unique – and also a democracy."

After the presentation

of the colors by Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus, the The Star Spangled Banner was

sung. A floral wreath was then displayed, having been presented by a French lady who, as a young woman of Jewish heritage in German occupied France during World War II, managed to survive the war.

In his remarks, Bishop Dewayne noted that the ceremonies of Veterans Day allow the community to come together to celebrate our veterans.

The bishop noted that although we are called to be men and women of peace, at times we must rise in defense of our country. He commented that the United States has stepped forward to defend other people as well as our own, citing as one example our involvement

in the Balkan conflicts which took place as a result of the breakup of the former country of Yugoslavia.

Bishop Dewayne acknowledged that not all of the wounds suffered in combat are physical, and that citizens should get involved and work to honor our veterans, stating that "It's not up to somebody else."

After the mass was ended, amid a backdrop of service branch flags and Knights of Columbus banners, Bishop Dewayne offered a blessing over "dog tags," which were brought to the ceremony by veterans.

The ceremonies concluded with the playing of "Taps."
