immediately receptive to the idea. "They help me support it and do an enormous amount of work," Freni says.

AVID has been implemented in more than 7,000 elementary, secondary and higher-education schools, including Carlos E. Haile Middle School and Braden River High School, in 47 states across the country since its inception in 1980 in California.

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Not looking to while away the hours playing canasta at the clubhouse, she spearheaded the revitalization of the long-dormant Lakewood Ranch Medical Center Auxiliary, which raises money and awards \$1,000 scholarships to nursing students. In fact, as the organization's president, she helped pull it into the 21st century in October by renaming it the Lakewood Ranch Medical Center Foundation.

"Being a foundation enhances our ability to raise money and for people to make contributions," Cowan explains. "An auxiliary is more involved in a lot of activities. Foundation better defines our primary objective - raising funds to create scholarships for nursing students — and our broader mission to make sure the workforce is there for the future."

Since coming back to life, the auxiliary-cum-foundation has generated modest but nonetheless valued 2019 and eight in 2020. Ten awards Medical Center Auxiliary. are slated for 2021. Cowan says that no master plan exists to transform the organization into a fundraising juggernaut. "Sure, we'd like to have large donations," she says. "But for now we're comfortable with where we are, and [we] will take opportunities as they arise."

Last year, the foundation granted scholarships to all of the students who applied.

Largely due to the pandemic, the nonprofit altered its fundraising approach in 2020. For the first two years, the bulk of scholarship money came from the Jingle 5K race, which exclusively benefits the auxiliary. In 2020, the event was conducted virtually, with participants receiving a bib and a chip that timed their individual run. The virtual race took place over several days in late December.

Not surprisingly, the virtual 5K did not generate as many dollars as a live one, so the foundation shifted its focus to promoting individual name scholarships sponsored by businesses, individuals and families. Mary Weems was one of last year's recipients. She works as a licensed practical nurse at the Lakewood Ranch Medical Center and is currently taking classes at State College of Florida to become a registered nurse, which she's on track to earn in December. "The scholarship has been very helpful," Weems says. "It's money I don't have to pay off in school loans over the years."

Weems, a married mother of an 11-year-old, juggles three 12-hour shifts a week at the hospital, mixes in classes and has one day off. She has witnessed up close the stress that the COVID-19 pandemic has put on the hospital, and nurses in particular. Early on, Weems says, several of them contracted the disease and had to quarantine, stretching the staff. A few guit for fear of working under such risky circumstances. Nurses designated for COVID-19

rooms have to heavily gear up with personal protective equipment. "When we put on gowns, gloves, masks, respirators, face shields and the rest, we know we won't take them off until we're done treating the patients," Weems explains. "That means you can't eat or drink or go to the bathroom. I've seen some nurses work like that from 7 a.m. to 4 in the afternoon. It's hot — they come out drenched in sweat. Those pictures of lines imprinted on nurses' faces are real."

Regarding nurses being hailed as heroes during the pandemic, she says, "In the first three or four months, that recognition helped our spirits as we tried to get through all the changes. But as time wore on, I feel like we've come back down to earth. We do still need to feel like people need us."

None of these issues has dampened Weems' desire to become an RN. "When you sign up for this, you know you'll be in sketchy situations," she says. "I know the job isn't easy, but it makes me feel like I'm making a difference in the world. Every person you care for lifts your spirits. It's grueling, but you come home at the end of the day knowing you did good work and helped people."

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class act New Player in Town

The Players CEO William Skaggs shares the reallife drama of shepherding Sarasota's longestrunning theater company during COVID-19.

s 2021 begins, The Players Centre for Performing Arts is looking forward. Building on the success of the December production of "Dickens," at temporary home The Bazaar at Apricot and Lime in Sarasota, the company plans for outdoor productions at multiple sites around Sarasota County. This "road show" approach will be the norm this year, as the company awaits construction on its new theater — a \$30 million performing arts complex that will anchor the near-complete Waterside Place in Lakewood Ranch. We spoke with Williams Skaggs, the CEO of The Players, on relocating with his family to the area, moving forward with a new facility and what it's like to helm a 90-year-old Sarasota arts institution during a global pandemic.

You joined The Players last September, after leaving the Southern Kentucky Performing Arts Center in Bowling Green. Were you a lifelong Kentucky resident before this? I was. I grew up in eastern Kentucky, went to Bowling Green (Kentucky) for college at Western Kentucky University, and then I stuck around.

Were you totally new to the Sarasota area and to Lakewood Ranch?

I would say I'd known a little about the area. I have a little bit of family that now lives in St. Petersburg, so I had some familiarity. I became very interested and impressed with the entire Sarasota-Manatee county region and what the arts and culture mean to this community and how it's valued. That immediately caught my eye in a very big way.

You're married with three children (wife Jenny, 13-year-old Ben, 11-year-old Madeline and 8-year-old Julianne). How are they adapting to the Florida lifestyle? The Bowling Green area is what my children have known. When you do things like have dinner outside on Christmas Eve and go to the beach on New Year's Day, then yeah, that's a little different for a kid from Kentucky.

You have inherited a large fundraising campaign to pay for the construction of a new theater complex at Waterside Place. It has only been four months, but how is it going? The most important piece of that, and really more broadly with The Players, has been to further get to know the organization. You have your donors, your sponsors, and you have others in the community that are looking forward to this new project. You have these many different lenses through which people know The Players. It's been interesting, fun and important for me to get to know what all of those different lenses might look like.

How has COVID-19 affected your fundraising strategy? Has the pandemic caused you to pivot in your planning for 2021?

As a brand-new person not only to The Players but to the community, I would say it has in some ways slowed us down in that process. When you mentioned pivoting, it also means you find other ways to do it. Sometimes that's a Zoom call; other times it's a phone conversation that prior to the pandemic was probably a coffee. It's about relationships, it's about people, it's about listening. So pandemic or not, that's still the reality we live in.

building. They give to other people that are involved with organizations they believe in — people that share the same passions and share many of the same values as it relates to how we provide for our community. So we've still got to do a lot of the same work, and we are. But back to your comment about pivoting, we're finding additional ways to do the work we've always done.

Waterside Place is nearing the end of construction. How does that impact your fundraising? Ultimately, it's an asset. Waterside beginning to move to an initial completion and starting to open up is extremely exciting because it's going to give everyone an opportunity to be there and say: "Oh, this is what's been talked about. This is where The Players is going to be." They don't have to imagine the shops and restaurants down the street or the people who live nearby. It's right there.

Speaking of construction of a new facility: Any updates on a timeline? Is it still over the horizon?

I wouldn't say it's quite over the horizon. We can see it. When the pandemic struck, it caused the organization to have to look internally to move forward in a responsible way from an operations perspective. The campaign and the new facility really had to be set aside for a while. What I can say when it comes to groundbreaking is that we will be looking at no later than spring of 2023. My hope is we can break ground more quickly than that, but it's not something I would want to promise anyone.

How is the creative staff handling all the uncertainty and upheaval? You know, it's challenging while sometimes maddening and certainly invigorating ... all at the same time.

Parents play an important role in Niki's ability to effectively transform behavior because she provides goals and recommendations to help them

stav involved in their child's treatment as well as generalize skills and teach appropriate verbiage. In addition, she is uniquely trained to treat children with comorbid mental health disorders, including Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD).

Life of LUXURY

WheelBase Premium Garage Condos offerscar enthusiasts not only a secure placeto store their vehicles but also a community.

itting just on the outskirts of Lakewood Ranch is a gated community complete with Wi-Fi, concierge services and a clubhouse. Hidden behind bright yellow doors are condominiums that range in size from 674 to 2,480 square feet. The smallest unit can be bought for \$164,500, and the largest will set the owner back a half million. But while driving through the complex,

one will easily see it's not for living.

Think of it as The Ritz-Carlton for your Bentley.

WheelBase Premium Garage Condos, located at 1600 Sarasota Center Blvd., Sarasota, offers a selection of 46 garage condos that are climate controlled and 150 mph impact-rated. The units, completed in September, act as a mecca to some of the area's greatest car enthusiasts.

At the helm of the company are Hans Schmeits and Dennis Brozak, like-minded businessmen and car enthusiasts. Both men have too many cars for their home garages, so they began brainstorming ways they could safely work on and store their cars.

"We thought, 'Everyone needs a third space," Brozak says. "You have your home space, your workspace, and you need a hobby space. If you don't belong to a country club, and you're not a golf



enthusiast, where do you go to hang out? Where do you go to enjoy your cars?"

After coming up with a concrete plan, they began a permitting journey for a 54,000-square-foot facility that confused many Sarasota County officials. The 5-acre site sits in an industrial park, but the project wasn't for business or residential use. It also wasn't strictly storage units or a typical condominium complex.

"They did a good job of trying to understand the project," Brozak says. "It's always hard to be the first, especially when it doesn't fit into a specific category."

Everything in each unit is customizable, from the mezzanine size and style down to the type of ceiling fan. Each condo has its own high-speed internet, HVAC split systems, 14-foot insulated overhead doors, half bathrooms and utility sinks.

"We really want to make sure that what we built was created for people to be comfortable and fit all of their needs," Schmeits says. "We tried to think about every scenario a car enthusiast would run across in our design."

A 2,000-square-foot clubhouse at the front of the property features a kitchen, a bar, a laundry facility, a lounge area, showers, a conference room and an 800-square-foot outdoor party space. A car wash station sits just behind the front gate, and security cameras line the entire property.

"It's all about making sure the owners feel safe," Brozak says. "If you're seasonal, and you're going up north for a few months, you know your cars are safer from both a weather and security perspective."

Since opening, 25 units have been sold. Already they've been filled with some of the most spectacular cars the world has to offer — a race-driven 1960 Porsche 356 B Super 90 Roadster, a 2020 C8 Corvette and a 1997 Land Rover Defender, to name a few. Artists, entrepreneurs and craftspeople also use the space for studios and workstations.

But for many of the owners, Wheel-Base has offered something even greater than a secure place to store their cars: a coterie of like-minded enthusiasts, which has more value to them than any 1963 Ferrari 250 GTO.

Don and Tara Olsen, Country Club East

Since he was young, Don Olsen has loved cars — but not just any cars. Jaguars. Something about the fast and sophisticated sports car has always drawn him in.

In 1985, at age 35, Olsen bought his first Jaguar. There was just one problem: His home had a two-car garage.

"The problem I had was I would fall in love with a new car that I'd see, and I'd want to buy it, but I had no place to put it," he says. "So anytime I bought a new one, I had to sell a car."

Throughout the years, Olsen has owned about 15 Jaguars. So when he found out about WheelBase, he knew he had a permanent spot for his collection, which currently consists of five

Jaguars. His 1,700-squarefoot unit could hold up to 10 cars, though.

Although some garage owners take pride in rebuilding their cars, Olsen's satisfaction comes from something else: cleanliness. It takes him about a year after purchasing to get his cars in top-notch condition. And although he has drip pans beneath of his cars, they're spotless.

"I only look for cars that are in absolutely top-notch condition, the best of the best I can find," Olsen says. "I clean them up, and I call these cars garage candy because I don't drive them much. I just look at them."

And while the downstairs is Don's domain, the upstairs mezzanine is a haven for Tara, where she can work on her embroidery business,

15 Needles. It's stuffed full of fabrics, embroidery floss and a TV to keep Don entertained while she works.

"It's a hobby and a business, but it's something I enjoy doing," Tara Olsen says. "I don't do it to make money. I do it to further my enjoyment and hopefully make a few dollars."

Tara Olsen says she has several more items to move into her mezzanine before she gets her business up and running. As for Don, he just sold one of his Jaguars, so he has a space to fill.

"Don't laugh now, but I'm thinking of getting a GTO," he says with a chuckle.

IN THE UNIT:

1: The first of Don Olsen's 1991 XJS Jaguar is a convertible. Both cars have the same interior and exterior. "Everything's the same," Olsen says. "It took me quite a few years to find the exact two that I wanted." 2: A neon sign that reads "Don's Den" was a gift from Tara Olsen.

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Terrence Williams, Country Club East

Williams stumbled across WheelBase after he and his wife decided to retire to Lakewood Ranch and couldn't find a lot big enough to build a garage to accommodate his car hobby. After doing some Google searches. Williams came across an article about WheelBase and immediately purchased a unit.

"It was literally just dirt at that point, but I knew I was going to want one," Williams says. "It was a space that would accommodate my cars but also be something that would allow us to hang out, watch football and relax."

Like a lot of young boys, Williams says his early interests were shaped by those of his father. His father is a

Steelers fan, so he's a Steelers fan. His father's a car person, so he's a car person. There's just one area they disagree. His father is a Ford person, but Williams is a Chevrolet person.

For Williams, there is one car that is above all the rest: the Corvette.

"When I was a little boy, just the sleek styling of the body, the shapes, the curves, everything about the Corvette, I always just fall in love with," he says.

His 1,250-square-foot unit is an exact replica of the detached garage he has at his home in Ohio. The unit currently houses five cars while the others remain up north for now.

Although he doesn't do complete overhauls, Williams says he enjoys doing minor fixes himself. A lot of his cars also fit the restomod style — where a car looks like the original make with a completely new engine, transmission and suspension — because he enjoys racing.

"I enjoy speed," Williams says. "There's a track up in Ohio called Mid-Ohio, and they have a couple days a year where they let guys like me come down and get on the track."

But for Williams, who was so used to working by himself in his garage in Ohio, WheelBase has offered a community.

"My garage in Ohio, it's just me," Williams says. "But now we get to have cars and coffee events, walk around to our neighbors' garages, help each other out and see what everyone is interested in."

IN THE UNIT:

1: The 2003 Corvette is one that Williams has raced before. All of his cars have unique license plates. "My wife, Carla, picks on me because all my license plates are kind of funny," Williams says. "One says 'R U Fast 2,' another says 'Y Try Me,' so she always jokes that I'm like a teenage boy." 2: Williams' 1969 Chevy Chevelle is a restomod with its original body and chas-

sis. "That's about where it ends," Williams says. "Everything else under this car is new. It has a rumble that's unbelievable." 3: The mezzanine is decked out for optimum sports viewing with lounge chairs, two flat-screen TVs and a bar. It also features sports memorabilia including signed helmets and photos of Williams with some of his favorite players. 4: Williams' unit is outlined with a yellow and black

stripes in support of his favorite NFL team. the Pittsburgh Steelers. 5: A GMC truck is Williams' daily driver. On the weekends he trades it in for one of his sports cars. 6: Williams' 1973 Corvette Stingray is another of his restomod projects. Everything in the LSX454 engine is new, and it has about 600 horsepower. It also features wider tires than normal, so it can handle the horsepower.





7: The 2020 C8 Corvette is the first-ever mid-engine Corvette, which means the engine is located behind the seats. Since the first model in 1953. the engine has always been located in the front of the car.



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Bob Bailey, Siesta Key

As a child, Bob Bailey's father would take him to the race track. When he was around 10 years old, his father took him to Sebring International Raceway, where he got to meet Stirling Moss, a British Formula One driver.

"That day changed my life," Bailey says. "I really got the bug for racing and began racing when I was 18 years old."

At the time, people had to be 21 years old to race in the U.S., so Bailey went to Canada for three years. His career spanned 15 years, with his biggest win at the 24 Hours of Daytona in 1971. He finished first in the GT class and seventh overall.

His love of racing evolved into a business called Racemark International, which started out making racing safety equipment. Eventually, he began collecting race cars of his own, each with its own story. Some of his cars have personal connection while others, such as his 1954 Jaguar XK-120-M, are linked to people like Elton John's business manager.

Before WheelBase, Bailey had to store his cars below his beachfront home on Siesta Kev. During hurricane evacuations, he would have to move all of his cars off the barrier island. So he decided to move his cars into a 1,600-square-foot unit in July 2020, and he says it's "been a blast."

"This facility is just over the top with quality and workmanship," Bailey

says. "They just put the whole package together to get a group of car guys together in a location that is fantastic to exercise these cars in."

IN THE UNIT:

1: The 1968 Porsche 911 Lightweight was the first of six prepared specifically for the Trans-Am series in 1968. Bailey raced the car in the 12 Hours of Sebring and the 24 Hours of Daytona. Around 10 years ago, a movie producer fully restored the car and contacted Bailey to tell him that he was going sell it at auction. "How could you pass that up?" he says.



2: Bailey's walls are decked out with old racing posters of some of his favorite cars throughout the years. Some posters even feature photos of him during his racing years. 3: Bailey displays the origi-

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Clark Prosperi, Heritage Oaks Golf & Country Club

Unlike most of the condo owners, Clark Prosperi is not a car guy. He's an artist. While most of his neighbors toil away with an engine, Clark is perfecting colors to paint a jellyfish.

Prosperi has been painting since he was a kid growing up in São Paulo, Brazil, and his first career was as an art director for a major advertising company.

"At the time, there were a lot of artists working in advertising because there weren't computers," Prosperi says. "Everyone knew how to draw,

and everybody was pretty much an artist, so it was phenomenal."

While living in New York City, Prosperi rented a studio and started taking commissions. He fell in love with the work and decided he would be a professional painter. He studied with artists including Joseph McGurl and Mark Carder. Since then, he's painted for dignitaries, athletes, cruise ships and famous people.

All the while, Prosperi says he has never stopped studying everything — from art history to the way light hits a person's hair. He describes his style as pop or contemporary realism, and although he works in all mediums, his favorite is oil.

"Painting with oil is like cooking [with] the best stove and knife in the whole world," Prosperi says.

He draws inspiration from the world around him, and any time he gets an idea, he immediately stops what he's doing to write down the idea, the mood he hopes to emit and how he wants the final image to look.

Prosperi tries to paint in his studio every day, even if he's not feeling a certain inspiration. He also teaches students how to paint — from lines and shading to what he calls the most important trick, color matching — from his unit.

Although he's not a car guy, he is still enjoying the community at Wheel-Base. He is even working on a painting of a car for his neighbor, Don Olsen.

IN THE UNIT:

Volunteering in the Age of COVID-19

The pandemic forced dozens of nonprofits to bench hundreds of senior volunteers. Some organizations in Sarasota and Manatee counties are still struggling to fill the void one year later.

early every Friday for 10 years, Sandy Mongiello was the first face people saw when they arrived at Nate's Honor Animal Rescue. As a volunteer greeter, the 66-year-old Heritage Harbour resident was responsible for holding down the welcome center at the front of the 8-acre Lorraine Road campus.

Chatty, newly retired and gaga for dogs, Mongiello was a natural concierge. She fielded giddy questions from adoptive families in search of the perfect pooch and offered resources and a sympathetic ear to families struggling with loss and other heartbreak. Sometimes she'd walk the dogs and help tend to incoming puppies, but most of her six-hour shift was spent behind the sign-in desk. She felt useful there. Plus, she says, she inexplicably liked the "wet-dog smell" perfuming the inside of the 300-square-foot building.

"I did it for the animals," Mongiello says. "Some of them would come in shaking, scared to death with their tails between their legs ... and you'd know a special person would come in and see past the fear and the things people think are homely — the snaggleteeth and buggy eyes. You'd get the followup pictures and emails, and you'd see how an animal can blossom with the right person."

The grandmother of four, whose previous health issues and business trips made it difficult to adopt a dog of her own, also developed an affection for her fellow volunteers — a quirky, motley crew of dog and cat people that she jokingly describes as "a wonder-

Despite being open by appointment only, Nate's still adopted out 1,805 pets in 2020 — just a couple hundred fewer than the rescue's typical yearly average. Most impressive of all: The organization did it with a fraction of the workforce.

Prior to the pandemic, the no-kill shelter was powered mostly by volunteers. Cage cleaning. Dog walking. Adoption counseling. Animal transport. Community outreach. Laundry and kitchen chores — all of it executed by an army of unpaid 60-somethings (mostly) that were thrown out of rotation for their own protection.

The few individuals permitted to stay on have been relegated to doing clinic runs and Petco cat adoptions, leaving the rest of the work to just five paid employees, who at the same time are contending with a \$10 million campus expansion currently underway.

where 60 different agencies are currently looking for the donation of time.

"Charitable giving [of time and money] is in our community DNA," Kirby says. "There are still opportunities for people who are looking."

Even major health care nonprofits are easing off on restrictions. In August, Tidewell Hospice reopened its volunteer-run thrift store and allowed some of its 1,200 daily volunteers back into facilities - barely. Greeters wearing face masks and shields are now permitted to answer doors, screen and sign in visitors, and run temperature checks at some hospice houses.

Antoinette Muirhead, who volunteered at Tidewell's Lakewood Ranch Hospice House for three years, says that her responsibilities look nothing like they did before COVID-19, but that's OK.

"It used to be if you saw someone having a hard time, you could say, 'Can I give you a hug?' Now you say, 'I'm giving you a hug in my heart." Muirhead says.

An oncology massage therapist and ceramic artist, Muirhead was working at Florida Cancer Specialists and volunteering at Tidewell and Daybreak Adult Day Center when the pandemic hit. At Daybreak, she helped with arts and crafts projects, and at Tidewell, she gave patients foot massages.

Last March, she lost all three of these posts in one fell swoop, including the place where she sold her pottery, Bok Tower Gardens in Polk County, until Tidewell called her back at the end of the summer.

The Parrish resident says she's thrilled to be of service again in whatever capacity she's needed.

"Sure, it's different now or a new normal, as we're calling it," Muirhead says. "But it's not about me. The nurses are so busy. If what I do for a couple hours makes their lives easier, I'm there."

Mongiello says she feels exactly the same way about having to wait for her position to open back up at Nate's.

"As a volunteer, you start to selfishly think: 'Oh, no! They forgot about me.' But there's so much more to consider than your small role," Mongiello says. "Dari and Rob have continued the mission through all of this. They're saving dogs and cats, and that's what matters most."
