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


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High-End Mexican Comes to Lakewood Ranch

Fuego Comida and Tequila Lounge is Now Open

ot that this is something over which great minds would deliberate, but what comes to your mind if the subject of décor in Mexican restaurants comes up? Pictures of bullfighters painted on velvet? Colorful cerveza ads strung together and hung from the ceiling? Silver-embroidered sombreros?

Here's the thing ... if you venture to spend some time at Fuego Comida and Tequila Lounge, you will find none of the stereotypical items listed above. No beer ads. No bullfighters. No tiled floors.

And that, friends and neighbors, is one of the things that make Fuego a totally unique experience for Lakewood Ranchers.

That's because Fuego is to the "typical Mexican restaurant" what some of Mexico City's modern buildings are to the old colonial structures. It has a modern, no frills, classy vibe, different from many things elsewhere in Lakewood Ranch. I might call it "subdued elegance."

My wife and I went there for dinner one evening recently. Upon our arrival, we confirmed with the hostess at her outdoor reception desk that we did, indeed, have a reservation.

We were led into the restaurant, at first observing the large bar area, which features tables with "fire pit" centers, and a small sit-down bar at the far end of the space. This area has obviously been designed for groups of people, to enable them to gather with their friends and/or family, relax and have a few drinks and food in an elegant space.

We chose to eat indoors, as it was still pretty warm outside, and there was a relatively strong wind blowing. We were offered our choice of seating, and chose to eat at a four-top table in the center of the dining area, our choice being partially determined by the fact that the chairs around those tables looked the most comfortable. The dining area features two-top tables along one wall, four-top tables in the center, and large booths along another wall. The booths feature "floor to ceiling" privacy, decorative sconce lighting, and would fit up to six comfortably.

As a tip of the sombrero to the past, the concrete floor is dyed in the coloring of those old-time Mexican tiles. On the wall opposite the booths, there are little white cup-like pieces, which look like eggshells with gold centers, strewn across the length of the wall.

Anyway ... to the drinks and food! Fuego has a selection of several specialty margaritas, including one made with water-melon juice, and another called "Day of the Dead," which includes Camarena Reposado tequila, blood orange liqueur, lime, hibiscus syrup, activated charcoal agave, and a smoke bubble. Sounds positively, well, cryptic.

If you've ever been to a Mexican restaurant that serves extra-large margaritas, prepare to have that experience oneupped. Fuego has what they refer to as "cocktail towers" These are self-dispensing towers containing a full three quarts of your



favorite cocktail!

We hadn't multiplied ourselves sufficiently to go for a cocktail tower, so my wife had a cup of tea while I decided on a glass of Pachanga beer – a light beer which made a good pairing with my food.

Our waiter, Eric, answered some of our questions about menu items, noting that Fuego likes to get fresh food – not frozen – for its dishes, and we made our choices. My wife decided to go with what she thought would be a typical quesadilla. However, instead of being served as a large tortilla with bits of chicken and veggies on top, this came out as small tortillas with a very hot pan of large chicken pieces, onion slices and several full-sized sweet peppers, with a side dish of guacamole sour cream, etc. I, being a fan of such peppers, relieved my wife of the chore of eating a large dose of them by adding a couple of these tasty delights to my plate.

As for my choice, I went for something I'd never had before – lobster enchiladas. It proved to be a quality choice, as I dined on enchiladas filled with large chunks of lobster. The enchiladas were topped with a green chile sauce with a crema drip and sev-





eral slices of avocado, along with thinly sliced red onions and bits of radish.

Delightful. We were both quite happy with our selections.

Fuego has a dessert menu with some interesting creations but, as we both like chocolate mousse, we decided to share a serving of the Fuego Mousse. The dark chocolate was excellent.

One interesting thing about Fuego – I took notice of the dishes that were used and in turning one over to see where it was made, I was nicely surprised to see that that particular set of dishes had been made in England. The cups and saucers used to serve the coffee were interesting also – a dark, non-glossy black design ... and made in Germany.

Since Fuego Comida and Tequila has just recently opened, the word has probably not gotten around to everyone in Lakewood Ranch quite yet, but now you know.

Fuego is something special in Mexican food, and is located at 11615 State Road 70 East, in The Green shopping center, which is located on the northeast corner of State Road 70 and Lakewood Ranch Boulevard. Hours are as follows: "Before menu" (lounge and patio only) 4-6 p.m. Sunday through Saturday; "After menu" (lounge and patio only) 10-11 p.m. Sunday through Thursday, and 11 p.m. -2 a.m. Friday and Saturday; and dinner service, 4-11 p.m. Sunday through Thursday and 4 p.m. to 12 a.m. Friday and Saturday. 

"I love to be able to help other women feel better about themselves." Izzy & Gab Boutique is an upscale women's contemporary apparel store, providing pretty things. It is also named after Stephanie's daughters, Isabella, and Gabriella – two teenagers attending

local middle and high schools. Isabella's passion is animation arts and she has her eye on The Ringling College of Art and Design after graduating high school. Gabriella is a budding young actor who enjoys performing arts, singing, and learning from her Los Angeles acting coach. Naming her boutique after her daughters reflects how special Stephanie thinks Isabella and Gabriella are; the girls feel incredibly special to have their mom's boutique named after them. Stephanie's son Seth has a successful career in Atlanta, Ga., where he lives with his wife Casey and daughter Layla Mae - Stephanie's first grandchild.

Her oldest daughter is actively recovering from chronic Lyme disease and has been thriving since her recent medical treatment, which she learned about from an Izzy & Gab

customer. Soon after Izzy & Gab opened, Stephanie and Isabella flew to Germany for Isabella's medical care, staying for five weeks in a hospital specifically treating patients with rare tick-borne diseases. Stephanie credits the the Out-of-Door Academy high school seniors who managed Izzy & Gab in Stephanie's absence. "Being so new to the community, there was no way I could have done it without these amazing young ladies from the Out-of-Door Academy, my husband, and youngest daughter stepping in an carrying on," Stephanie said. "I am so grateful."

Stephanie is currently authoring a book about Isabella's journey toward recovery. Chronic, late-stage Lyme disease and rare tick disease is extremely hard to diagnose. It took 17 years of searching from hospital to hospital, never giving up, to finally find the cure Isabella needed – all because of Izzy & Gab Boutique. Stephanie looks forward to the publication of Isabella's incredible, tragic, and remarkable story, "I want to help other parents become aware," Stepanie said. "It is known as the great mimicker disease, as it can mimic so many other illnesses and diseases."

When Stephanie and her family have free time, they enjoy bike rides throughout Lakewood Ranch, swimming in their Polo Run pool, visiting Lido Key Beach, and stopping for dinner at a restaurant on St. Armand's Circle. Music on Main is a monthly routine for the family, as Izzy & Gab Boutique stays open for the duration of that event.

Stephanie is extremely excited about the prospect of opening another local Izzy & Gab location. Meanwhile, Stephanie and Jarrod continue to explore home options for their future, forever home in Lakewood Ranch. Stephanie loves the Waterside neighborhoods and town center ... A village with golf would be a good fit too ... actually, anywhere in Lakewood Ranch will be perfect!



The Hallowine Walk is the brainchild of Scott Shortt, proprietor of Fine Wines and Tastings on Main, which has become a valued part of the Lakewood Ranch Main Street milieu. It offers a mix of wine tastings, a small wine bar where friends can

meet and have a glass of their favorite, and perhaps even order a charcuterie board, spending some quality time in a low-key, friendly atmosphere.

Shortt and his crew set a numerical limit of 200 tickets so that the participants didn't get overwhelmed in an overly-large crowd. The tickets this year cost \$50 per person for an entire evening of strolling around Lakewood Main Street, sipping wine at numerous locations, and having a terrific time with old friends – or meeting new ones.

Several of the Lakewood Main Street merchants chose to participate in the Hallowine Walk by allowing for a wine tasting table to be set up in their establishment; each of the merchants hosting tastings had a selection of wine from certain regions.

The wines for the Walk had prices that ranged from \$12.99/ bottle for an Australian chardonnay to a high of \$79.99/bottle





for a Napa Valley cabernet. Each Hallowine taster was given a flyer showing which wines were available to taste at the various locations, along with a list of prices. Hallowine walkers got a 10% discount on the listed wines at Fine Wines and Tastings.

Not all the merchants wore cos-

Not all the merchants wore costumes, but the ladies at Fantasy Flowers greeted their guests looking like a pair of blossoming flowers – one of which included the pot! Rather appropriate! There were also a lot of very attractive witches – some of whom came bearing their brooms, and some with an entourage of girlfriends. Indeed, the Hallowine Walk apparently had become the go-to

event for a girls' night out – at least on this particular evening.

There was one more perk for those who did the Hallowine

Walk: discounts and goodies from various Lakewood Main Street restaurants. These perks ranged from \$6 burgers at Ed's Tavern and free appetizers at Inkawasi and McGrath's Irish Ale House, to a free dessert with entrée purchase at Pincher's. Several other restaurants offered discounts as well.

The Hallowine Walk was great adult fun for all who attended. I'm looking forward to next year's addition. Who says Halloween is just for kids?


GREETING YOUR GUESTS BEFORE THE MEAL: PROSECCO ROSÉ

One of my guilty pleasures (and I have many) is drinking Josh Prosecco D.O.C. Rosé. Its price is super reasonable and dang it, it tastes great. Josh Prosecco D.O.C Rosé is a delightful sparkling wine that combines prosecco's effervescence with a rose's charm. In the glass, it captivates with its alluring pale pink color. Its delicate and elegant hue is visually enticing and hints at the lively experience. On the nose, its bouquet is vibrant and fragrant, offering a burst of red berries and citrus notes. Strawberries and raspberries take center stage, accompanied by hints of orange zest and subtle floral undertones. The aroma is

Ithough some paving projects have been put on hold because of cost concerns, there are some that will impact Lakewood Ranch residents – especially in the Country Club area and at the Town Hall. The schedules below were given to supervisors during the Community Development District board meetings in October:

- The Town Hall parking lot is expected to be paved between Nov. 27 and Dec. 25. During the paving and striping work at the Town Hall, the entire Town Hall parking lot will be closed to vehicles. Residents who need to visit Town Hall during this time frame are being asked to park their cars in the closest area of the Main Street parking lot.
- The Masters Avenue East paving project is expected to take place between Oct. 23 and Nov. 22.
- The Keswick paving project in District 5 is expected to be done between Oct. 23 and Oct. 27.

NEW TRAFFIC SIGNAL AT LAKEWOOD RANCH BLVD. AND CLUBHOUSE DRIVE

Manatee County has begun work on the new traffic signal to be installed at Lakewood Ranch Boulevard and Clubhouse Drive. The poles for the signal lights are already installed, and the entire job is expected to be completed in early 2024.

FEMA REIMBURSEMENT STATUS

Executive Director Steve Zielinski informed the supervisors that a new FEMA official has been assigned to work with Lakewood Ranch on its claims for the expenses that the districts have paid out for cleanup and repair costs related to the damage from Hurricane Ian last year. The expenses are currently under final review at FEMA. Zielinski has requested that FEMA pay the claims from districts 1 and 4 as soon as possible, as there apparently has been a reluctance on the part of FEMA to pay expenses from the Country Club districts (2, 5, and 6) because those areas are gated, even though such expenses were paid by FEMA after Hurricane Irma, and no one is restricted from entering through the Country Club gates.

EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

The Lakewood Ranch Inter-District Authority has been able to secure health coverage for employees for next year at a cost of 1.8% over the current amount. Employees will be compensated for any increase in their contribution. This

amount is less than last year's increase of 2.7%.

SAFETY TOWN

Supervisors at the District 1 board meeting congratulated Supervisor Laura Fox for organizing the Safety Town program held to promote safety among our youngest residents. Supervisor Bob Swiatek, noting that a lot of the cost had been paid by Fox herself, suggested that the District contribute money next year to finance the project.

RAINFALL

Operations Director Tom Merrell reported that once again, the rainfall in Lakewood Ranch in September was far below average.

In a related matter, during the District 2 board meeting, resident Christine Mazur came to the meeting and showed pictures of the pond behind her home. She noted that the pond was pretty much devoid of water, and that plants had grown over areas previously filled with water.

Operations Director Merrell explained to her that such ponds, when they are full, are full of rainwater, and that Lakewood Ranch does not make a practice of filling ponds that go dry. He noted the drought conditions that have persisted recently, and that lack of rain had contributed to the lack of water in the pond. When rainfall amounts increase, so will the water level in the ponds.

GATE SURVEY

Also during the District 2 board meeting, resident Les Prysock asked if the District had received results from a survey that was to be done relative to residents' feelings regarding gate practices. Board Chairman Pete Bokach replied that he expected that survey results would be available by the start of budget workshops, which will begin again in March of 2024 for the 2025 fiscal year.

There was also another question raised about the striped sawhorses on the sidewalks around Lakewood Ranch Boulevard. Operations Director Merrell commented that the sawhorses were there to mark trip hazard areas on the sidewalks. Those trip hazard areas will be ground down to reduce the possibility of injuries.

LAKE UIHLEIN BANK EROSION MITIGATION

The bank of the lake, which had been damaged by Hurricane Ian, will need repairs. The project will be handled by the Kimley-Horn engineering firm, and they will set the standards for the repairs, as well as handle the bid process for the work.

TRAFFIC SIGNAL VS. ROUNDABOUT

The debate between backers of a traffic signal and the backers of a roundabout at the intersection of Lorraine Road and Players Drive continues. For the most part, the residents of Country Club East appear to favor a signal, while the residents who live in the eastern portion of the Country Club appear to favor a roundabout.

The matter was scheduled to be decided at a meeting of the Manatee County Board of Commissioners on Nov. 14.

"PROPER DECORUM" REOUEST

During the District 2 board meeting, Supervisor Mike Finney commented on a rather nasty conversation/confrontation between two supervisors at the previous month's District 5 meeting. Accusations against staff were made, and some very crude language was used. The supervisor who initiated the confrontation was at this month's District 5 board meeting, and admitted that he'd used poor judgement in attacking staff, and should not have used the words he had used.

Finney, on hearing of the incident, had listened to a tape of the meeting, and requested that a "proper decorum" policy be drawn up by attorney Andrew Cohen, to

be adopted by all district boards in Lakewood Ranch in order to maintain civility in government meetings. Several other supervisors voiced their agreement with Finney on this.

ADVENTURE PARK PAVILION WORK

District 4's Adventure Park Pavilion, which was severely damaged by a fire on July 4, has been demolished, with the exception of the concrete pad. As reported last month, the fire was ruled accidental, and no charges will be filed. The District is working with the architect in planning for the rebuilding of the pavilion, which is expected to happen in late 2024. The new pavilion will be constructed to be more fire-resistant.

EXCESS WATER USAGE

Operations Director Merrell reported that an irrigation pipe had sprung a leak in District 4, and that the problem had not

been found right away, as the leak happened in the area of a drain, so there was no obvious outpouring of water. The leak has been fixed, but District 4's reclaimed water bill will be higher than normal because of the leak.

UTILITY TURNOVERS TO MANATEE COUNTY

Both District 2 and District 6 have been negotiating with Manatee County officials about turning over potable water systems to the county. One of the problems has been the fact that the people who Lakewood Ranch officials had been dealing with at the County are no longer with Manatee County, and with the influx of new officials there have been many additional requirements added by the County – items which had not been previously on the table. Lakewood Ranch officials were scheduled to meet with Manatee County personnel on Oct. 23 to see if they could arrive at a basis for agreements.

PERSONNEL VACANCIES

The only Lakewood Ranch staff position that has not been filled yet is that of the chief financial officer. Interviews were scheduled during the week of Oct. 16 for this position.



What to Know About Foot & Ankle Pain Foot & Ankle Health

extremities, so it's no surprise that foot and ankle pain becomes a common problem with age. If you're experiencing pain in your feet and ankles, James Cottom, DPM, FACFAS a foot and ankle specialist at Florida Orthopedic Foot and Ankle Center, provides helpful answers to your questions and concerns.

WHAT ARE THE MOST COMMON ANKLE ISSUES?

Not all ankle pain is created equal. Some pain may be due to wear and tear on the tendons and joints, arthritis, or traumatic injury. The most common kinds of ankle pain that Dr. Cottom treats are ankle sprains, Achilles tendon pain and cases of arthritis. Sprain injuries are typically caused by twisting or inversion to the ankle, and often occur with a sudden fall, a misplaced step or other trauma. Chronic pain, on the other hand, can often be a sign of arthritis.

However, telling the difference between the types of foot and ankle pain can be challenging. The foot and ankle alone consist of 28 bones and 33 joints, not to mention muscles, tendons and ligaments. This makes it especially important to properly evaluate each patient. "For serious cases of pain or discomfort, an

MRI or CT scan may be necessary beyond X-rays and a physical exam," said Dr. Cottom.

HOW DO I KEEP MY FEET AND ANKLES HEALTHY AND PAIN-FREE?

We bear weight on our feet and ankles every day – whether we're at work, exercising or standing in line at the store. According to Dr. Cottom, maintaining foot

and ankle health can be as simple as seeing a specialist when you're first experiencing an issue. "It is often very easy to calm most pain or injuries down if we get to treat them right away," he said. "We want to avoid chronic injuries and often, in these situations, more extensive treatment may be warranted."

In most cases, Dr. Cottom prefers to explore all available options before turning toward surgery. We like to start with conservative, in-office treatment in almost all situations," he said. "If a patient does not respond to that treatment, then we have the option of looking into something more involved."

WHAT SHOULD I LOOK FOR IN A SPECIALIST?

"When deciding on a foot and ankle specialist, I would encourage patients to look for a physician with fellowship experience," said Dr. Cottom. "A fellowship is unique in that the

physician completed extra training in foot and ankle treatment, including surgery. There's a low percentage of foot and ankle physicians who have actually completed a fellowship after residency training."

Dr. Cottom completed a yearlong orthopedic foot and ankle fellowship at the Orthopedic Foot and Ankle Center in Columbus, Ohio, under the mentorship

of orthopedic/podiatric foot and ankle surgeons, before arriving at Florida Orthopedic Foot and Ankle Center.

Do yourself, and your lower extremities, a favor by looking out for foot and ankle pain — and if it starts, see a specialist. The rest of your body will thank you.
