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Kids Enjoy "Safety Town" at LWR Town Hall

hat makes little boys and little girls want to be firefighters? What sort of fascination is there with fire trucks and all the various pieces of equipment that firefighters haul around in those brightly painted trucks?

All that equipment is the stuff of dreams. Big trucks, huge hoses, lots of ladders, and all sorts of specialized equipment. The kids who showed up at the Lakewood Ranch "Safety Town" event at Town Hall had a great time.

Upon their arrival at Safety Town, they were presented with a big orange bag that included goodies as well as handouts on various home and community safety items, including a coloring/activity book featuring police, firefighters, EMS personnel, and medical responders. Each child also got a big red plastic "fire chief" hat. Most of the kids showed up with parents, although some came with grandparents.

As for the adults manning the various dis-

plays and booths, they were wearing capes – like all good superheroes.

Kids got to climb up into the cab of big fire trucks – not only the East Manatee Fire/Rescue truck, but the Manatee County Search and Rescue truck – a monster truck that can go off-road in a big way on its huge wheels and tires. The first responders had the lights on their trucks flashing, and what kid could resist checking them out?

But hands-on experiences are what can make an event like this truly memorable for a kid. The firefighters from East Manatee Fire/Rescue had all sorts of specialized equipment on their truck. I was definitely impressed by the pair of "Jaws of Life" tools carried on their truck. To think that these tools can enable first responders to literally cut a person out of a damaged car (think: giant can opener!) is amazing.

For the little guys and girls, the firefighters had a special treat; you might call it a test of strength. As the kids watched, the firefighter pulled down from its place on the side panel of their truck an axe, and passed it to the kids



to see if they could handle it. Note that this axe was pretty much as tall as the kids, and there was no way that any of them could muster the strength to swing it. They could barely hold on to it! But think about it. These kids will remember the opportunity to hold that fire axe for the rest of their lives.

The firefighters may have been the stars of the show, but there were other agencies and



opportunities to check out. If the firefighters were allowing kids to play with THEIR toys, the Manatee County Sheriff's Office Crime Prevention deputy not only talked about safety, but they gave out toys – fidget spinners. Their vehicle had signs stating things like "See Something ... Say Something" and it also had a big sign on it warning adults to lock their cars so as

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to prevent things inside from getting stolen.

Safety when out and about in our region is important. We live in an area with lots of water, and the folks at the Goldfish Swim School were there to promote learning how to swim – and how to stay safe in the water. They even brought their mascot – a big orange walking fish!

The Florida Department of Health office in Manatee County came by with hints for parents about eating well and avoiding foodborne diseases. The kids had fun playing with the plastic food.

Urgent Care was there to give out water bottles and information on their services; and Nate's Honor Rescue came with an adoptable dog, of course, and information on the shelter, as well as on emergency procedures for our pets.

HOPE Family Services was there to inform the public of their 24-hour crisis help line. They provide counseling, legal services, contacts for community resources, and shelter for the abused. One of their flyers read: "Is Someone You Love Hurting You?" with their crisis line phone number: (941)755-6805.



Yes, the kids who came to Safety Town had a good time, but it was also an event to inform the community at large. The first Lakewood Ranch Safety Town event was held pre-COVID, and was a big success.

Once again, the event was spearheaded by Lakewood Ranch Community Development District One supervisor Laura Fox, and her merry band of volunteers. Thank you, Ms. Fox!

Maybe next time I'll get to sit in the driver's seat of that fire truck!



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








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The Magic of Lakewood Ranch Women's Club Holiday Dinner Theatre Raises Over \$20,000 for Charity

The Crucial Role of Electrolytes

With Dr. Rushiv Patel, DO

Dr. Rushiv Patel of Lakewood Ranch Medical Center answers the most common questions regarding the minerals that may be a mystery to most. He provides his insight as to what they are, what they do and why you need them.



WE HEAR ABOUT THEM ALL THE TIME, BUT WHAT ARE ELECTROLYTES, REALLY?

Electrolyte is a simpler term for ions that carry an electric charge and can conduct electricity. The major electrolytes in the human body include sodium, potassium, chloride and phosphate. They're minerals, and they're essential to our bodies to ensure proper functioning, which includes maintaining fluid balance, supporting nerve function and facilitating muscle contractions.

WHAT IS AN ELECTROLYTE IMBALANCE? IS IT A COMMON ISSUE?

An electrolyte imbalance occurs when there is an excess or deficiency of one or more electrolytes. This may result from dehydration, certain medical conditions/illnesses, or an inadequate diet. Electrolyte imbalances are relatively common but are only a cause for concern if and when they become severe, which would require medical attention.

Electrolyte imbalances may present in ways like muscle cramping, weakness and fatigue, irregular heartbeats, dizziness, confusion and changes in blood pressure. If a person is experiencing these symptoms, it's crucial to contact and discuss this with their physician. A healthcare provider can conduct screenings and tests to help diagnose the imbalance and compose a treatment plan. Treatment may involve dietary changes, supplements or hydration therapy.


CAN AN ELECTROLYTE IMBALANCE LEAD TO FURTHER COMPLICATIONS?

If severe, an imbalance can absolutely lead to serious complications. This includes cardiac arrhythmia, muscle spasms, kidney problems, and, in extreme cases, life-threatening conditions like seizures or coma. This is why prompt treatment is necessary, and avoiding an imbalance at all is more than helpful.



Steering clear of an electrolyte imbalance can be as simple as staying hydrated and eating a balanced diet full of fruits, vegetables and whole grains. You should also pay special attention to healthy habits in times of electrolyte loss during exercise or illness. An easy and quick way to replenish electrolytes is through sports drinks.

Being mindful of electrolyte levels can be beneficial for anyone and everyone, especially those with certain medical conditions. High blood pressure, kidney disorders or those taking diuretics should consult with a healthcare professional to help regularly monitor their electrolytes – it's crucial for overall well-being and takes everyday effort. Physicians are on the medical staff of Lakewood Ranch Medical Center, but, with limited exceptions are independent practitioners who are not employees or agents of Lakewood Ranch Medical Center. 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Lakewood Ranch Ranks No. 1 In The Nation For Sixth Consecutive Year

akewood Ranch has maintained its ranking as the number one best-selling, master-planned multi-generational community in the nation for an impressive six consecutive years, as recognized by RCLCO, an independent real estate consulting firm. "Lakewood Ranch's stellar performance this past year is a testament to its dynamic market segmentation strategy, superior marketing, appealing lifestyle, great execution, and the professionalism of the development team," said Gregg Logan, managing director at RCLCO.

In 2023, despite spiking interest rates, the community achieved 2,257 sales (22% above 2022), marking it as the second-highest sales year in its history. This was partly attributed to builders' strategic initiatives to draw potential resale buyers into the new home market. Laura Cole, senior vice president of Lakewood Ranch, commended the builders for their efforts in leveraging mortgage buy-downs, accelerated build cycles, and move-in ready homes, while also highlighting the financial benefits of lower insurance and maintenance expenses associated with new construction.

Emphasizing the commitment to enhancing the quality of life, Cole reiterated Lakewood Ranch's dedication to fostering a vibrant, multi-generational community that caters to diverse life stages and budgets. The community's recognition in the Urban Land Institute's new master-planned community




publication underscored its segmentation and varied product offerings, acknowledging its broad appeal. Furthermore, Rex Jensen, president and CEO of Schroeder-Manatee Ranch, the developer of Lakewood Ranch, was honored with Zonda's 2023 Legend Award, recognizing outstanding contributions to the planned-community sector.

The sales landscape in Lakewood Ranch witnessed a significant shift in 2023, with a notable 37% of new home sales originating from within The Ranch and Sarasota and Manatee counties. "Many of these sales were attributed to renters seeking perma-

nent residency after experiencing limited choices during the pandemic," Cole said. "Other local sales came from buyers who experienced a life change, precipitating the desire or need for a new home in our community."

Expanding beyond Florida, markets such as New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, Chicago, Washington, D.C., Atlanta, and Boston contributed significantly to sales, with Tampa and Miami making the top five feeder markets for the first time. Anticipating an increase in in-state moves due to equity growth, Lakewood Ranch foresees more buyers relocating from within Florida.

Celebrating its 30th anniversary in 2024, Lakewood Ranch plans to introduce nine new villages and neighborhoods while launching a newly incorporated section in the northeast comprised of three communities that will have great appeal based on recent successes: Saddlestone (multi-gen), Del Webb Catalina (age-restricted), and Calusa National Golf (bundled golf). The Ranch is also introducing two new homebuilders to its portfolio, Homes by WestBay and Dream Finders, and Erickson Senior Living will break ground on Emerson Lakes, a 1,200-unit continued care retirement community located north of SR-70. New schools, a county library, enhanced amenities at the Premier Sports Campus, updated town centers, and various other developments are also in the pipeline.

eet Karen McDowell, Lakewood Ranch resident and business owner. Karen moved to Lakewood Ranch from New York; she was born and raised in The Bronx, spending time in City Island, a warm and friendly neighborhood on the Long Island Sound.

Karen's career has afforded her the opportunity to work from home, as an attorney with the Federal Government ensuring civil rights in education. She has always been committed to serving the community in a variety of ways, and still seeks to volunteer to help people. When she decided it was time for a new locale, Karen considered several warm places throughout the United States, including both coasts of Florida. Through her travels to and via her research for the best location, Karen discovered Lakewood Ranch and began planning for her 2022 move.

Karen selected Lakewood Ranch for its lifestyle offerings and the excitement of a developing community. Being a lover of beaches and boating, Karen chose this location for its proximity to both, as well as the activities and appeal of an all-ages community. 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THE (PET) DOCTOR IS IN!

what are you hoping to improve in the new year? Many of us hope to live a healthier life through good diet and exercise this year. Most of our pets could use this too, but they need our help (and motivation) to do so.



Most American pets are overweight or obese (almost 60%) from a mixture of too many calories and too little exercise. Just like us, many dogs and cats that are simply put on a diet don't lose weight or they regain the weight that they do lose shortly after that goal is met. That's why they need a lifestyle change that includes diet and exercise.

There are so many foods out there, it can be confusing to decide which one is the right one for your pet. For pets who are already a little pudgy, it is a good idea to switch to a light or diet food that is going to have more fiber and less calories per cup. These foods are not going to taste as good and you may notice a decrease in appetite, which is ok as long as they are still eating it. Any food change should be done gradually, over 1-2 weeks, to avoid upsetting their stomach. Of course, if your pet is on a special diet for medical reasons, you should consult your veterinarian prior to switching foods. Also, consider how many snacks and treats your pet gets. There can be a surprising amount of calories in all those little



goodies. Did you know that a large milk bone has 125 calories in it? That's ¼ of the total daily calories for an average 30-pound dog. Try healthy treats like baby carrots or green beans so that they can keep snacking with you but in a healthy way.

The key to a truly healthy lifestyle is exercise. Just like us, it is a good idea for pets to get a checkup from their doctor before starting any exercise program, to make sure their bodies are able to handle it and there are not underlying medical reasons for the excess weight. For our couch potato pets, we need to start slow and build up stamina over time. While taking a walk or playing fetch are good dog activities, cats are a bit harder to convince to get moving. Many cats can be enticed with a laser pointer or interactive feather toys. Even if you have to hide low calorie treats around the house to entice them to "hunt," at least they are working for their calories.

The most important part is to recognize small gains as successes and do not solely focus on setbacks. This is a journey that will take time, but you can do it together!
