# Ed's: A Tale of Two Taverns

omewhere among the sands of time, in the 1930s in New Jersey, a guy opened a tavern. Given that Prohibition had ended, folks liked the idea of being able to go to a neighborhood place that had good food and, even more important, served alcohol.

The tavern business was a pretty good business to be in back then, and the guy's nephew, years later in 2008, thought that it would be a good idea to commemorate his uncle's bar by opening a place called Ed's Tavern, in a Florida town called Lakewood Ranch.

The Lakewood Ranch Ed's Tavern was built on Rodeo Drive next to the town's movie theater, which made it a convenient place for people to go before or after a show, or a great place to hang out after an afternoon of golf or shopping.

Ed's Tavern seemed to have that right mix of good food, good drinks, and a friendly staff – in short, a place for everyone, in all seasons. Ed's Tavern flourished. Outside seating was added, and patrons could enjoy good weather and watch the water birds fly in and out of the shores of Lake Uihlein.


In 2014, the original owner of Ed's Tavern sold the place, but Ed's remained a staple of Lakewood Ranch. With all the success of Ed's Tavern, and the love that the Lakewood Ranch community had for Ed's, there soon arose an issue. The original Ed's Tavern had been built when most Lakewood Ranch residents lived north or south of S.R. 70.

However, a lot of the new development in Manatee County was happening to the north of S.R. 64. Manatee County built a two-lane bridge to connect Upper Manatee River Road with Fort Hamer Road on the north side of the Manatee River. All of a sudden, there were a whole lot more people up there than there had been just a short time prior.

Soon, gas stations, fast food franchises, car washes, nail salons, and storage lockers were built. But there remained a lingering question.

"Where up here can we find a place like Ed's Tavern – a friendly sports bar that not only is a great place to come to and unwind after work or play, but a place that we can go to with our family?"

The owners of Ed's Tavern took notice of this "service hole," and in mid-January of this year, a new Ed's Tavern opened off Upper Manatee



River Road, just north of S.R. 64.

The menu and drinks are the same as are offered at the "original" Ed's. But for those who live a ways north, driving into the parking lot of the new Ed's Tavern is a little like a homecoming. Maybe even better.

Ok, so at the new Ed's Tavern you won't have a lake view, since there is no lake right outside the walls. On the other hand, the new Ed's almost feels like someone decided to "supersize" the old one, but on a smaller footprint.

On a recent trip to the old Ed's, I counted something like 22 TVs. There were around 20 stools at the bar. At the new Ed's Tavern, I counted 20 stools at the bar – but that was just the inside portion of the bar. At the new Ed's, half of the bar is on the inside of the structure, but the other half is outside, along with something like another 18 bar stools! The new Ed's has a nice roomy inside, but there are screens outside, and the new Ed's has accordion-style doors that can be closed or opened to enable outside seating, depending on the weather.

As for the number of TVs at the new Ed's (I might be off by a couple) I counted 28 large TVs, many on or facing the patio area, in addition to two massive TVs using 4, 60-inch units, making for 10-foot screens. If you can't find your favorite team playing on at least one of those TVs, they either have a bye week or they aren't playing.

My wife really likes bar food, so I took her to the new Ed's. She ordered the brisket sliders, and really enjoyed the fact that each slider came topped with a nicely cooked onion ring, plus a nice helping of cole slaw.

As for me, I believe that the test of a good sports bar is their classic burger. The new Ed's did not disappoint (Ed's has eight different burgers on the menu). I got a half-inch thick beef patty, cooked just as I requested, with a tomato slice, pickles, and a slice of cheese, plus

fries. The beef patty was firm, and not dripping fat, unlike burgers I've had at other places. We both rated this bar food as excellent. As for soft drinks, I generally go for Coke products, but be advised, Ed's serves Pepsi.

The new Ed's Tavern is located at 1305 108th St. E., right behind Wawa, and right off Upper Manatee River Road. Happy hour runs from 4 to 7 p.m., with lots of specials on food and drinks. Regular hours are 11 a.m. to 12 a.m. Monday through Thursday; 11 a.m. to 1 a.m. Friday and Saturday; and 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. Sunday. For more information visit edstavernfl. com or call (941)329-1010.



# Pond Fishing Regulations Coming to Lakewood Ranch

t may be news to some residents – fishing in our lakes and ponds in Lakewood Ranch is not illegal, but there are things you should know. First, it is allowed on a catch-and-release basis. You can fish around here, but you have to put your catch back into the lake or pond from which it came.

Executive Director Steve Zielinski discussed this issue with members of Lakewood Ranch's Community Development District (CDD) boards at their April board meetings, after he realized that there was no specific community-wide policy on fishing in the community.

Attorney Andrew Cohen is working with Lakewood Ranch staff to develop a reasonable policy that can be adopted by all of Lakewood Ranch's CDDs, that will regulate just where people can fish. (For example, fishing is generally prohibited behind homes.)

Warnings were also made regarding alligators. Most Lakewood Ranchers know that it is illegal to feed alligators in Florida, and that gators are potentially more aggressive during mating season, which this is. It is not a good idea to harass an alligator at any time, but especially during mating season. Also, people should never get close to or disturb an alligator's nest unless they are looking for some serious trouble.

#### PAVING ISSUES, CELL PHONE SERVICE, ETC.

During the District 1 board meeting, a couple of topics were somewhat hotly discussed. One was the condition of some of our roads – with emphasis on Lakewood Ranch Boulevard and University Parkway – but on Manatee County-maintained roads in general. Supervisors were unanimous in their disgust over the condition of the county-maintained roads, noting that Lakewood Ranch is a premier community, but our main roads do not always reflect that.

Executive Director Zielinski noted that one reason that the county-maintained roads deteriorated faster than, for example, roads which had been re-paved within the confines of the Lakewood Ranch Country Club, was that the County does what is referred to as a "mill-and-pave" job. This means that they mill off a layer of the current pavement, and simply place a layer of new asphalt on top of the milled area.

While this may look fine for a while, it does not address any underlying problems, such as a defective base layer underneath the road, or a drainage system that has failed. Lakewood Ranch Boulevard is a prime example of what happens when the basic causes of road deterioration have not been addressed. Hence, lots of potholes and patches over patches.

When Lakewood Ranch Operations contracts with a paving contractor, part of the work order involves fixing any underlying issues before new pavement is put down, thus providing the best possible chance for a long-lasting job.

As for cell phone service, this is an issue that has troubled Lakewood Ranch for over 20 years. Cell service in our community can be spotty, and the major carriers seem to be in no hurry to improve service.

The District 1 board had invited County Commissioner Ray Turner to attend its April meeting so as to discuss these issues with him, but he had to attend a special commission meeting, and was unable to attend. Executive Director Zielinski planned to meet with Commissioner Turner later in April to discuss this with him, along with the County's plan for the intersection of The Masters Avenue and Lorraine Road.

#### **EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS**

Lakewood Ranch staff is updating the community's emergency preparedness plans. When complete, they will be given to Lakewood Ranch CERT for its input.

The various CDD boards approved their participation in the Statewide Mutual Aid Agreement. This provides for one community to assist another in case of an emergency.

#### **PAVING COST**

Future paving costs will have to be addressed in the Country Club. To underscore the seriousness of the issue, it was reported that the paving of the Town Hall parking lot, budgeted in 2023 at \$90,000, came in with an actual completion cost of \$241,000 in 2024.

#### RAINFALL

Operations Director Tom Merrell reported that Lakewood Ranch got approximately 1" of rain in March of this year, well below the average of 4" for March.

#### **DISTRICT 4 ADVENTURE PARK PAVILION**

The District 4 Board has authorized staff to come up with a replacement cost for the Adventure Park Pavilion. After considerable discussion about the needs of the community, and

#### LWR Women's Club's Raises over \$21,000 for Charity

the desire to get this project going, the supervisors decided to make few changes in the structure of the new pavilion. It will be rebuilt using the current slab, which is essentially undamaged and will not need to be replaced. They would like to make changes to make the new structure more fire-resistant, but plan no other major structural changes, save for a few adjustments, such as moving grills out from under the canopy, and providing better walkway access to the facility.

#### **NEW RESIDENT ORIENTATION**

An orientation session for new residents (or current residents who want to learn more about how Lakewood Ranch functions as a community) will be held at 5 p.m. May 21 at the Town Hall. Attendees must RSVP to the Town Hall beforehand.

#### **GATE ENTRY DISCUSSION**

The District 6 board discussed the possibility of issuing transponders to certain nonresident individuals, such as caregivers, to enter the Balmoral gate during the hours it is normally closed to traffic (10:30 p.m. to 10:30 a.m.). The consensus was that these people could enter through the Legacy gate. Supervisor Susan Ellis reported that she recently drove from the Balmoral gate around to the Legacy gate to see how long it would take. # Rotary of Lakewood Ranch Announces Grants for 2024

hat organization invites people to buy tickets to a giant party, winesand-dines them, serenades them, and in the process, collects lots of money ... and then gives it away? Rotary of Lakewood Ranch. That's the one!

Rotary of Lakewood Ranch President Sybil Porter opened the presentation of award grants made possible by the funds raised through the Club's annual Suncoast Food and Wine Fest, held in November of last year at the Premier Sports Campus in Lakewood Ranch. The event netted over \$130,000 for the club's charitable efforts. Fest Chairman Steve Kelle was congratulated, and Barbara Jones, the sponsorship chair, thanked the sponsors who helped to make the event a great success.

Bob Grepling, chairman of the Awards Committee, presented grants to 26 groups and organizations. Grepling said he knew that the 2023 Food and Wine Fest was a great success because there were very few leftovers after 2,000 participants ate and drank their way through the grounds!

One of the hallmarks of grants given out by Rotary of Lakewood Ranch has been an emphasis on assisting children, and many of the awards went to those who make it their business to help kids.

In the ballroom at Lakewood Ranch Golf and Country Club, something stood out in a corner of the room: Maribeth Phillips and Frank Perry, of Meal on Wheels Plus of Manatee, stood next to a large basket of food. I was told that this was food enough to feed breakfast, lunch, and dinner for a family of 5 over a two- or three-day weekend – to make sure that the kids were getting nutritious food on summer days when school was closed. Meals on Wheels Plus of Manatee received a Rotary grant for this work.

#### **OTHER GRANTS WENT TO:**

- Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Sarasota for them to buy laptops for at-risk students.
- The Child Protection Center to provide for supervised visitation for kids who have suffered abuse.
- The Childrens' Guardian fund to provide summer camp experiences for 900-2,000 kids who are "in the system."

- Easter Seals of Southwest Florida for the "Easter Seals Academy," which works with kindergarten through 12th grade kids who are not keeping up with their educational goals.
- Embracing Our Differences for transportation costs for students to enable them to appreciate the arts, along with messages of kindness and inclusion.
- Feeding Empty Little Tummies to feed kids in 66 Manatee County schools on the weekends during the year when school is not in session.
- The Foundation For Dreams to serve special needs kids from ages 7 to 17 with a residential camp experience.
- The LECOM School of Dental Medicine to provide dental care services and to teach kids about maintaining their own oral health.
  - Lighthouse Vision to provide transporta-

tion for those with vision loss in five counties in Florida, from age 5 to old age.

- Parenting Matters to offer a program called "Music in Motion," in which kids can play with dinosaurs, and make use of parachutes, while getting ready for kindergarten.
- American Counseling Services of the Gulf Coast to pay for family counseling services.
- Stillpoint Mission to buy diapers to give away to families with babies up to three years old, and even older for special needs kids.
- Take Stock in Children of Manatee County to operate a "scholars' program" for deserving low-income kids. The currently have 244 active mentors serving 298 students, and the graduation rate is 99%.
- Take Stock in Children of Sarasota County has similarly served over 1,000 students, who sign contracts requiring them to stay crime-

free, drug-free and get good grades in school.

- Teen Court of Sarasota County to get kids who have gotten into trouble back on track to be contributing citizens.
- The Tidewell Hospice Blue Butterfly program to serve kids ages 5-18 who have experienced the death of someone in their life.
- Our Next Mission to renovate homes for at-risk veterans, many of whom are between 60 and 80 years old.
- Manatee County Search and Rescue to purchase a cardiac monitor that will enable the team to check on the victim's health condition out in the field.
- Parkinson's Place for Motion Disorders to hold classes for people with mobility issues.

Several other grants were made to various Rotary initiatives, both locally and around the world:

- Books for Kids, a Lakewood Ranch Rotary project which has given away 150,000 books to kids. The program is active in 10 schools, and serves 4,000 kids in 164 classes.
- Lakewood Ranch Rotary's Clean Water Project to provide water treatment facilities that can be operated by local residents in rural areas of Peru.

One grant went to Rotary of Anna Maria Island for a swimming and water safety instruction program for kids up to age 13.

Another grant went to Rotary of Venice/Nokomis for their cleft lip/cleft palate program, which pays the cost of a surgical team that goes to Peru to correct these conditions in children whose families can't afford it.

A grant was given to the Rotary Gift of Life program, a Rotary International initiative to provide cardiac treatment for kids in developing countries. This project has helped 50,000 kids since 1975.

A grant went to Shelter Box USA, a Rotary program that gives people who have suffered the aftermath of a disaster a shelter and the means of cooking meals.

How many organizations can put on such a fun event, and make such an impact? We'll see if Rotary of Lakewood Ranch can top the 2023 Suncoast Food and Wine Fest in 2024. Make sure to mark your calendars ... The 2024 Suncoast Food and Wine Fest will take place at the Premier Sports Campus on Nov. 2.

### **Robotic Surgery for Women's Health**

### Here's what women should consider before undergoing robotic surgery

She specializes in delivering comfort and compassionate care through all stages of a woman's life, and believes in guiding her patients to help them make informed decisions about their health. This includes deciding whether surgery may be the best next step in their treatment.



#### WHAT IS ROBOTIC GYNECOLOGIC SURGERY?

In general, robotic surgery uses a less-invasive method and allows surgeons to perform a wide array of procedures. Surgeons at Lakewood Ranch Medical Center perform these robotic surgeries using the da Vinci Xi surgical system.

Gynecologic procedures, such as removal of the uterus (hysterectomy), removal of ovarian cysts, removal of fibroids (myomectomy) or removal of endometriosis, can be performed with the da Vinci Xi surgical system. "The most common reasons for gynecological procedures are typically abnormal menses with heavy bleeding or pain, or general pelvic pain," said Dr. Yelverton.

Although she is a strong proponent for exploring other treatment methods first, there is a time and a place when surgery may be necessary. "Typically, I recommend a patient try medical management before surgery, since that's often a sufficient treatment," Dr. Yelverton said. "From there, we can evaluate the next steps."

For patients seeking relief from relentless symptoms like heavy or painful periods, urinary incontinence, pelvic pressure or vaginal bulging, robotic surgery could be an option.

#### THE RECOVERY PROCESS

Since robotic surgery is minimally invasive, it can often yield quicker recovery times than traditional surgery. This is possible due to a reduced blood loss and smaller or fewer incisions.

"Most patients go home two-to-three hours after robotic surgery. The surgery itself can take anywhere from an hour and a half to four hours depending on the complexity of the procedure," she said. "For a hysterectomy, it can take up to six weeks to feel completely normal again, but some women recover more quickly and are running errands much sooner. Post-op recovery is different for everyone, but I never recommend rushing the healing process. It's important to take the time that your body needs to heal."

Other benefits of robotic surgery can include less scarring,

lower risk of infection, shorter hospitalization and less pain or discomfort after an operation.

#### YOUR HEALTHCARE IS YOUR JOURNEY

"The decision for surgery is always a shared decision," Dr. Yelverton said. "I guide my patients with the information I have so that they can make the best decision for themselves. Everyone's journey is different and I'm here to walk with them through it, if it involves surgery or not."

Whether a person decides to undergo gynecological surgery is ultimately their choice, influenced by a number of factors. Dr. Yelverton believes in taking it slow when it comes to treatment. "Surgery is not right for every situation, but my job is to help women understand what their options are for their symptoms," she added.







#### THE (PET) DOCTOR IS IN!

pril showers bring May flowers ... maybe in the rest of the world! Here in Florida we are just ramping up to summer showers season. Get ready for the increased humidity and increased moisture. It's time to walk

the tight rope of hunkering down inside to avoid the bugs and heat, versus braving the outdoors in an attempt to not go stir crazy being all cooped up. The wet season also brings with it challenges for our pets who have been enjoying the outdoors for the past several months. Like us, our pets who are more used to activity and the stimulation of the outdoors can get extremely bored being inside and can sometimes even becoming destructive.

So how do we survive? Tackle one problem at a time, of course. Indoor time can be spruced up by playing interactive games or having training sessions rather than binge watching our shows. The increased humidity and moisture outdoors can lead to increased infections as moisture can be the perfect breeding ground for yeast and bacteria. Ears and feet are partic-



ularly prone to infections. Be sure to wipe down wet paws when coming in and get in the habit of routine ear cleaning to help avoid infections.

Wet season also brings about more parasites. Just like us, our pets can feel the sting of mosquitos, which can carry fatal heartworms. Our pets are also susceptible to

fleas and ticks. Be prepared by keeping your pets on heartworm and flea/tick control year-round. Then there are the invisible parasites like giardia, which are found in infected water sources – think puddles, and reclaimed water on the lawns. Try to avoid standing water and areas frequented by wildlife that can harbor parasites.


