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## **District Supervisors Establish Goals, Objectives**

■lorida Statutes, in Title XIII, sets up the requirements for the establishment of special districts and in Chapter 189, Section 0694, dictates that performance measures and standards must be established by special districts beginning Oct. 1, 2024, and that such districts must, by Dec. 1 of each year thereafter, publish an annual report on the district's website detailing those goals and objectives, and whether they were achieved or not.

In working with the Lakewood Ranch Community Development District boards, the Town Hall staff, in cooperation with attorney Andrew Cohen, has established guidelines for setting such goals and objectives, dealing with such things such as whether the boards have regular monthly meetings, the system for setting district budgets, whether budgets are set to include both regular operating expenses as well as reserves for unusual expenditures, the means of paying for district expenses, auditing of district finances, etc.

Fortunately, in Lakewood Ranch, we have a history of properly dealing with such items and district financial audits have, over the last several years, proved that the districts' finances have been handled in a careful and appropriate manner. Financial audits of the districts have come up as being "clean," or free of concerns.

Our Town Hall staff members have consistently been very responsive to the requests of the Districts boards, and things have worked quite well.

So, no issues should come of this new reporting/achievement law.

#### **ENGINEERING WORK ASSIGNMENT**

Each of the Lakewood Ranch CDD boards

approved their work assignment contracts with Dewberry Engineers for district engineer of record services.

Dewberry is the civil engineering firm that takes care of things such as the required inspections of our drainage facilities, among other items, and which may be called on to perform inspections of road drains, etc., depending on the need.

#### **LAKE UIHLEIN BANK EROSION MITIGATION**

The work to complete the Lake Uihlein bank erosion mitigation has fallen a bit behind, due partially to weather events, and the contractor doing the work has promised to add additional staff in order to complete the work by the end of October.

#### PAVEMENT MANAGEMENT STUDY

The pavement management study focused on Districts 2 and 5 roads in the Country Club is almost complete. The engineering firm that has conducted the study will present it to Town Hall staff for their perusal and after the staff has had an opportunity to ask questions about the findings, the study will be presented to the boards of those districts in a few weeks.

This pavement management study will assist those boards in determining which areas need attention soonest, and from that information, the boards can then proceed to decide just how to accomplish the paving needs of their districts, including how to pay for upcoming paving projects, since paving costs have essentially escalated in the last couple of years.

# Bar Italia Italian food in a modern "Florida feel" setting

That mental image do you get when a friend suggests a new Italian restaurant he or she has discovered? Tile floors?

Dim lighting?

Short Chianti bottles with candles stuck in their necks? Checkered tablecloths?

Wait staff dressed in black with long white aprons?

Something like the restaurant scene from "The Godfather"? All of the above?

Well......There's a new place located on the south side of University Parkway called Bar Italia, and, yes, the food choices are primarily Italian, but it has a very different vibe from what you might expect from an Italian restaurant.

The floors are not tile, but appear to be concrete of a color not unlike old marble. The lighting is not overly dim, and, no, you won't have to ask your server for a flashlight in order to read the menii

There are no old chianti bottles on the tables, and you will find white tablecloths, not checkered, in the main indoor dining

The wait staff members wear long aprons, but they are not white, indicating a little less formal dress code. And, unlike Louie's restaurant, in the movie, there is no neon sign in the front

So, what will you find at Bar Italia?

Well, for starters, the architecture of Bar Italia might be called an exercise in black-and-white. The inside walls have a largely white stucco look, and the structural components of the building are black, with lots of window space to let the Florida light in-without the Florida broil. If the weather is good, you can opt for a table outside, either under an umbrella or under a portion of the roof.

There was a large black-and-white photograph on the wall near our table, showing an attractive girl applying lipstick, using the rear-view mirror of her Vespa, with an old Roman aqueduct in the background. If that's too much black-and-white for you, there is also a large colorful portrait of a woman on another wall, near to the busy kitchen, which takes up about a third of the building.

There are lots of tables, with comfortable seats (no hard "bentwood" chairs here!), so you'll want to have a leisurely meal, maybe with a drink or two, or perhaps a bottle of wine. Bar Italia offers homemade limoncello!

It should be mentioned that, on Thursdays, wine by the bottle is offered at half-price. It's Wine Night!

As for the wine list, even though Bar Italia offers several bottled beer selections, and there are a number of very interesting cocktails on the libation menu, wine is king here. There are at least 35 different wines on the Bar Italia wine list, including seven Italian reds, six cabernets, sixteen whites of various types, a half-dozen sparkling choices, and a host of others. The decisions are yours.

Now, as for the food, we started off with a recommendation from our server, Kelly, with an order of Bruschetta Alla Enzo. This consisted of wood-fired crostini, tomato, basil, and fresh





mozzarella, and featured two kinds of small tomatoes. Quite tasty.

Bar Italia offers a multitude of pasta dishes, and they make their own pasta in-house daily. Fresh pasta is a key ingredient to great pasta dishes. Bar Italia also has a selection of pizzas, and you can order in advance, and pick up your order there.

For our main course, my wife chose the Crispy Chicken Limone, which was prepared with a parmesan crust, and served with arugula in a lemon-butter sauce.

Note: if you watched the NBC broadcasts of the Olympic games, you may have seen the segment which dealt with the idea that "cooking with butter makes everything taste better". I took a small "sample" of her chicken, and I must admit, that, even with my being a non-lover of chicken, I enjoyed it. She didn't finish her portion, and I finished it for her for lunch the following day! Even re-heated, it was very good.

As for my choice, I have always loved halibut, so I ordered the Seared Halibut Risotto, which came with a small piece of the fish, and a mushroom parmesan risotto. The risotto with the mushrooms was excellent.

For dessert, she chose spumoni ice cream, a rarely-found Italian treat, while I ordered something called an Affogato, which consisted of a cookie and a scoop of vanilla gelato, drowned in hot espresso. This dessert was excellent, and when it was



brought to our table, I noticed that other patrons were eyeing it. I hope that they ordered it, too, as it was very, very good.

The food is good, the service by Kelly was efficient without being pushy, and, at our request, she suggested a couple of items which we may have passed over if left on our own.

Altogether, an enjoyable evening.

The patrons we observed during our stay at Bar Italia were of multiple age groups, from younger folks up to and including older diners. We even saw a couple of families with small children.

The two-sided bar area is set up for a crowd, with a "secondary" narrow table a few feet removed from the bar seating, and equipped with stools, so that if you don't get a seat right away at the bar, you can gravitate to the secondary section, and you won't have to stand while enjoying your drink.





## **Clarifying Breast Cancer Screening Terminology**

Breast care navigator, Denise Andrews, BS, RDMS, RVT, BHCN, of the Breast Health Center at Lakewood Ranch Medical Center reviews some of the frequently used terms patients might hear regarding their breast health.

"Breast self-examination is a monthly physical examination of the breasts to help find lumps that could indicate cancer. A clinical breast examination is a physical examination of the breasts by a Denise Andrews, BS, RDMS, doctor or nurse, with the same intention RVT, BHCN of finding lumps that might be an early Breast Care Navigator indication of cancer," Andrews said.



"Screening mammograms are preventive measures for women with no concerns or symptoms," Andrews said. "A diagnostic mammogram is ordered if someone is having symptoms such as pain, a lump or other physical changes in the breast." This type of mammogram will focus on the area of concern to get more

According to the American Cancer Society, breast cancers found during screening mammograms are more likely to be smaller and less likely to have spread outside the breast, making cancer treatment easier.

Cysts may show on your imaging results, and there are different types of which to be aware. "Simple breast cysts are non-cancerous (benign) fluid-filled sacs in the breast. They occur most often among premenopausal women and typically don't require any treatment. The fluid can be easily removed if they cause tenderness or pain," Andrews said. "They don't increase your risk of breast cancer and don't turn into cancer."

Complicated breast cysts may have cloudy fluid inside them, and their borders may be irregular. "These cysts might be aspirated with a needle biopsy to remove part of the breast tissue or cells, which can then be sent to a laboratory for analysis," Andrews said. "Sometimes, the physician may wait and schedule a follow-up visit in six months, as there is a low chance of it being cancerous.

"Complex breast cysts are a step up from complicated cysts and have a mix of fluid and solid components. They are estimated to be breast cancer in up to 20% of cases.

"A physician will typically biopsy the breast tissue for lab analysis," Andrews said.

"Your physician may have mentioned that your mammogram shows you have dense breast tissue," said Andrews. "Breasts are made of fat and glands that produce milk and are held together by fibrous tissue. Women with dense breasts (approximately 40% of women over age 40) have more glands and fibrous tissue, compared to fatty tissue, which can look white on a mammogram, making it more difficult to detect cancer. Ultrasound and MRI are sometimes used as additional tests to help detect cancer in patients with dense breasts.

"As women, we are so busy. It can be easy to put off taking care of our health, especially when we're feeling well. But it's essential to schedule your screening mammograms," said Andrews. "It's the best way to find cancer early, when it's most treatable."

American Cancer Society screening recommendations for women at average breast cancer risk are:

- Women between 40 and 44 have the option to start screening with a mammogram every year.
- Women 45 to 54 should get mammograms every year.
- Women 55 and older can switch to a mammogram every other year, or they can choose to continue yearly mammograms. Screening should continue if a woman is in good health and is expected to live at least 10 more years.


